FIRST SNOW FALL—The first snow fall of the year which occurred yesterday was slight but sufficient to give a surface for sleighs and a number of these were to be seen upon the city streets last evening, adding a genuine Christmas touch.

DEATH FROM LOCKJAW—The death occurred at the P. E. Island Hospital last evening of Mr. James McEwen, of St. Peter's, fifty-one years of age, who was brought to the hospital yesterday morning suffering from tetanus, which he contracted from a slight cut in his foot made by a nail last Wednesday. The patient was in a very serious condition when admitted. Rigidity of the muscles set in, accompanied by convulsions which mercifully terminated in death in a short while. Tetanus is a most unusual form of poisoning, but there are other similar cases on record. The late Mr. McEwen leaves a wife and family, to whom deep sympathy is extended.

THEFT ON STEAMER—Upon the arrival yesterday of the C. G. S. Brant from River John the loss of \$75 belonging to one of the deck hands was reported to the police, who were requested to make a search on board ship. The money was missed Saturday and a partial search was made by the Captain while at sea. Last night Chief of Police Cameron and officer Trainor went aboard in compliance with a request from the victim of the theft and with the permission of the Captain but as the crew was not all on board no action was taken for the time being. The steamer had made no calls at other ports since the money was missing.

ADDRESS P. W. C. STUDENTS—An interesting address was given yesterday to the 3rd year students at Prince of Wales College by Mr. Basil Colbran, of the Federal Department of the Interior, on the subject of Migratory Birds. Mr. Colbran explained the various orders of migratory birds, the protection given to diminishing species and spoke also of the extinct species, the Great Auk and Passenger Pigeon. He stressed the deteriorating effect on geese and brant of spring shooting and explained the purpose and application of the M. B. C. A. (Migratory Birds Convention Act) with the penalties for violation. The open season for this Province, he explained, closes on December 14th. The students who numbered about 125, displayed a keen interest in the lecture and further addresses are looked forward to. Mr. Colbran left yesterday afternoon for Summerside. He returns on Thursday and is addressing the P. E. Island Fish and Game Association on Friday.
