IN THE FAR NORTH.
In the Northwest settlement and development are proceeding northward. One can now travel by rail in comfort to Edmonton, Alberta. From this point the Canadian Northern Railway propose building an extension northward to Athabasca Landing. Thence, with the exception of a "carry" around two or three rapids there is open navigation by way of Slave Lake and the Mackenzie River to the Arctic Ocean. And immigration is steadily pushing northward. Steamers now run on the Peace River and the Mackenzie and Slave Rivers. Two flouring mills have been built this year on the Peace River and two steamers are being built to meet the demands of the increasing traffic. At Fort Vermilion, 700 miles

north of the American boundary, a fifty barrel roller mill is grinding wheat for which it pays the farmer \$1.50 a bushel. This mill was established in 1886, and is no longer a mere frontier experiment. There is another mill at Fort Providence, on the Mackenzie River, 150 miles still further north. This is less than 400 miles from the Arctic Circle and the winter climate is far from being unendurable, while the summers are delightful. The far northern country is also described as very fertile and a "hunter's paradise."

BRITISH EXPORTS TO TO COLONIES

The London Daily Telegraph cites some trade figures which bring out in relief the importance of the Colonies as a market for British manufactures. Here, for instance is The Daily Telegraph's classification of British exports for the year 1901:

To United States	£ 18,400,000
To Asia, Africa and South America	53,900,000
To the whole of Europe	104,000,000
To British possessions	104,700,000
Total	£280,000,000

These figures are simple, clear and expressive. They show how trade follows the flag. They show that Britain sells more to her Colonies than to the whole of Europe. Another table quoted by The Telegraph shows that in the 30 years between 1872 and 1902 British exports (excluding coal) to the whole of Europe decreased by £21,400,000, while the British exports to British Colonies increased by £46,800,000. It is facts like these to which the attention of the British public is now being directed, and the facts are well calculated to convince the most sceptical of the great value of the colonial markets to Great Britain.

Montreal now proudly boasts that hers is the greatest grain shipping port in America. So far this year Montreal claims to have shipped 18 per cent more grain than New York, Baltimore and Boston combined.

An exchange takes note of the fact that this is the first time in twenty years that Mr. Blair has been out of office. He has been twenty-five years in public life since first entering the New Brunswick Assembly in 1879. In 1883 he became Premier of that Province, and held that position for thirteen years, during which time he carried four elections. He resigned in 1896, and was immediately appointed Minister of Railways.

A prominent Wall Street operator is quoted as attaching the greatest possible importance to the establishment by the United States Steel Trust of a great Steel Plant at Port Colborne, Ontario. He says it means that the United States will yet lose the world's market for steel products, which will pass to Canada, and that this will "remove the possibility of political union one degree further." He expects to see other of the great industrial corporations removing from the United States to Canada.
