HOSPITAL CAMPAIGN DRAMATIZED Owners of radio receiving sets throughout the Province will have an opportunity at 8.30 Friday evening, October 24, of hearing the first public performance of a new play. This dramatic production is entitled "Reaping the Harvest." Its final dress rehearsal was held last Monday at the Selection Supper of the Charlottetown Committees and teams in the \$250,000 campaign to complete the construction and equipment fund for the new Prince Edward Island Hospital, of which Mr. W. F. Tidmarsh is Commander-in-Chief. All the actors are Charlottetown residents. So is the manager and stage director of the production, Dr. T. E. E. Robins. The players are Mr. J. A. Bentley, Mr. C. M. Williams, Mr. C. C. Thompson and Miss Margaret Collings. The scene is the office of "Grouchaby Gotrox" a wealthy citizen of Charlottetown. This role is taken by Mr. Bentley. Another character is "Fuller Pep" which is played by Mr. Williams. Still another is "Wendall Leard" enacted by Mr. Thompson. The girl in the play is "Jennie Russ" which is played by Miss Collings. The time of the play is the present intensive stage of the Prince Edward Island Hospital campaign. When the curtain goes up Mr. Gotrox is seated at his desk in his private office. He is absorbed in work. Miss Russ is at typewriter desk in the outer office. Mr. Pepp and Mr. Strong who are team members in the Charlottetown volunteer organization, enter the outer office and approach Miss Russ. From that moment onward, the action of the play progresses steadily to the triumphant climax. Although there are many humorous features in the dialogue, the play really is highly instructive, as it shows volunteer workers how to approach rich but reluctant contributors and how best to obtain generous subscriptions from them. The comments of Mr. Gotrox embody all the objections to liberal giving in this campaign which have reached the ears of the Executive Committee or other volunteers. The play lasts about twenty minutes. It will be broadcast over CFXY through the courtesy of Colonel Keith Rogers, who is using his broadcasting station freely for the benefit of the Hospital. INSPIRING ALMONS CONTRIBUTIONS CHANGES TO CAMPAIGN PROGRAMME

Grand Total to Date in Hospital Contributions, \$75,014.

A shining example of unselfish devotion and tireless perseverance on the part of two little girls was the big feature of the First Rally Supper in the \$250,000 Prince Edward Island Hospital Campaign, held in the Social Hall of Trinity United Church, last evening. Those youthful standard-bearers of the Island's greatest fund-raising movement are Miss Freda Pickard, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Pickard, of 148 Euston St., and Miss Catherine Ramsay, daughter of the Rev. Dr. E. H. Ramsay, of 71 Upper Prince St. Both are ten years old. They have the honour of having made what is regarded by many volunteer workers as the most inspirational contribution to the construction and equipment fund for the new Hospital.

The achievement of these wee lassies was reported to the meeting by Mrs. H. Hooper Horne, Commander of the Women's Division, with eloquence that evidently touched all hearts in the crowded hall. "Freda Pickard and Catherine Ramsay walked into Campaign Headquarters last Saturday afternoon," Mrs. Ramsay related, "and said they had a contribution for the Hospital fund. They handed to Miss Edith Ings, one of the department chiefs in Headquarters, three one-dollar bills, which they explained they had earned themselves. "How did you earn the money?" asked Miss Ings. "By selling pansies, two bunches for five cents, was the answer. "The little girls then told Miss Ings that they had disposed of the flowers at a stand which they set up near the sidewalk in front of the Rev. Dr. Ramsay's house. It took them two weeks to sell enough pansies at the rate of two bunches for five cents to make up three dollars. They worked at the stand in all their spare time every day, and they told Miss Ings they were glad to do it for the Hospital. Miss Ings turned over the money to me, and I am having it reported to Mrs. J. A. McKenzie's team, No. 11."

Tumultuous applause followed Mrs. Horne's announcement, Freda and Catherine being cheered enthusiastically. Last night's report carried the grand total to \$75,014. The Memorial Committee at the Selection Supper had announced \$55,100 in advance (Continued on page 6)
