SEARLETTOWN NOTES.—The cold snap of the past few days has somewhat dampened the ardor of the farmers in their expectations of an early spring, but Tuesday and Wednesday proving fine and warm the season seems to be two weeks in advance of the ordinary year.—Rev. Mr. Wightman preached a very able and interesting sermon in the Searlettown Church on Easter Sunday appropriate to the occasion, the choir fully sustaining their part.—Quite a quantity of oats are being shipped from Albany Station and farmers are wishing for an opportunity to dispose of their surplus potatoes but they appear to move slowly this spring. Our local agent Mr. Charles McLean has done a rushing business this winter and spring in selling platform scales, many farmers in this locality having purchased from him. The maple sugar paddlers are at present on the annual beat and are if possible less scrupulous this year than ever before, as in former year, there was a little maple and a large admixture of West Indian, but this year we have it all manufactured from molasses (sugar and sold for the genuine article. Vendors had better have a care how they impose their wares on the overcredulous as the laws of our land will not bear them out in the receipt of money made under false pretences.—Mr. George Crue has the lumber on the spot and purposes building an extension to his already large barn. Mr. Crue is one of our most progressive farmers.—The people of this locality are pleased that Mr. Marshal Wright has secured the hauling of the milk to Albany factory for another year. No better man could be secured.—Mrs. Louis Wright celebrated her 84th birthday last month and is still smart and active as those many years her junior.
