**A night of song**—Miss Maloney's recital

The annual shooting match of No. 1 Company 82nd Battalion took place on Kensington range yesterday.

The death of Mr Gordon Houston, elder brother of Mr James A Houston of Spring Valley, is announced by letter recently received. Deceased was a barber and a prominent citizen of Concord, N. H. and was 33 years of age. His death was sudden and was the result of heart failure.

On Sunday night the house of John McLellan, Launching Road was destroyed by fire. The loss is a serious one as Mr. McLellan lost all his household effects. Stored in the loft was some 70 bushels of wheat and all his potatoes were in the cellar. Mrs. McLellan and her child barely escaped with their lives, having nothing on but their night clothes. The cause of the fire is not known. The building is not insured.

It having been decided by a committee of prominent citizens to insure each of the members of the South Africa Contingent, after considering the terms of several companies societies those of the Independent Order of Foresters were found to be the most generous and were consequently accepted. The High Chief Ringer of P. E. I. Dr. H. W. Robertson and other members of the Executive of the High Court being in the city the ceremony initiation was duly conferred in twenty-eight. This should commend the order to the favorable consideration of all loyal citizens as ordinary rates only were exacted and the local courts generously remitted all dues.

His great-grandfather Sergt. Andrew Duncan served in the Peninsular War under Wellington, and was in thirteen general engagements. He received several wounds though none of them were serious. He also received two medals and his son Andrew Duncan of West Royalty, has one of the medals in his possession. Is there anything in heredity?

**The Lake Huron.**

Early yesterday afternoon, word was received in the city that the Lake Huron, of the Elder Dempster Co., had passed Cape Traverse en route to this port.

Two tugs, the Fred M. Batt and the William Aitken, went out to tow her into her berth, and Capt William Bitt succeeded in docking her at 6 o'clock. The Lake Huron is a fine ocean going steamship of 2,576 tons net register. Her engines are 500 nominal horse power compound type. She is of the well-decked pattern and was built by the London and Glasgow Shipbuilding Co. v. in 1881.

Many of our readers will remember that the Lake Huron was the ship that was quarantined at Goose Isle last year having on board 2,500 Dakhobors.

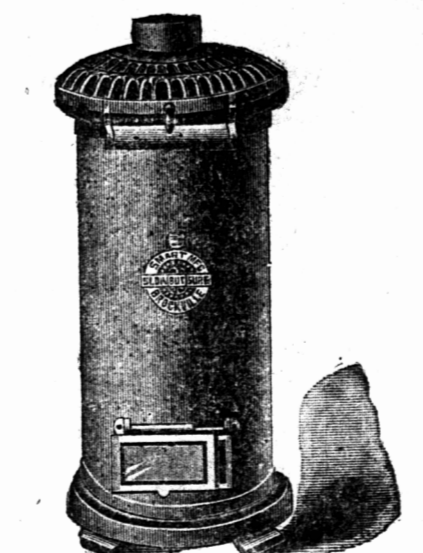
