Professor Dismissed, Students Strike

KALAMAZOO, Mich., Dec. 14—The Canadian-born president of Kalamazoo College, who dismissed a Canadian member of his faculty for not becoming a citizen of the United States and for "lack of versatility," had a students' strike on his hands today.

The students quit classes when Dr. Stewart Grant Cole, native of Brockville, Ont., and the college president, asked Dr. Carey K. Ganong, professor of economics, from Jemseg, N.B., to terminate his contract next June. Dr. Ganong is a graduate of Acadia University, Wolfville, N.S.

In a statement issued at noon, Dr. Cole said his action was taken because the college needed a "versatile man" and because Dr. Ganong, appointed three years ago, had not become an American citizen.

Dr. Cole became a citizen of the United States in 1929.

30 Skiers Buried Under Avalanche

ROME, Dec. 14—An Alpine avalanche in Pordoi Pass buried 30 skiers under tons of snow today. All were students.

A rescue squad all Alpine troops and civilians saved 12 of the skiers. Nine dead were extricated from the snow. The remaining nine persons were not yet accounted for.

The pass is in Bolzano Province in northern Italy.

or along sides being necessary for heat circulation. This permits shippers to place greater loads in cars.

Other features of the new cars, developed by the Canadian National Railways in co-operation with Dr. C. D. Niven of the National Research Council, Ottawa, were described by Mr. Macdonald. They had been under experiment for the past two years and were used principally for transport of bacon from western provinces to Saint John and Halifax for shipment to the United Kingdom. Curing of bacon continued aurore and it was important that the temperature be uniform. Cars returned west loaded with bananas and tomatoes.

Mr. J. F. Lafferty, Charlottetown yard agent will supervise loading of the thermoreefer here and Mr. Macdonald will do similar work at Albany. The cars will be moving to the mainland Thursday and will be accompanied by Mr. Macdonald as far as Moncton for the purpose of instructing employees at Bordent, Tormentine and Sackville in the operation of the new heaters. Mr. E. W. MacKinnon, superintendent of the Prince Edward Island region, was an interested spectator yesterday when he was shown the operation of the new heater by Mr. Macdonald. He felt that it would be of great assistance in handling potatoes and other products from this Province and hoped that the railways would see fit to provide a large number of these cars in the not too far distant future.

Held In Britain For Illegal Entry

EDINBURGH, Dec. 14—(CP Cable)—A woman claiming she was born in Vancouver, B. C., today was sentenced here to 21 days imprisonment for entering Great Britain illegally from Germany.

Mary A. J. Stricker, the prisoner, told the Sheriff's Court she was married in Vancouver in 1928 and was deserted by her husband, starting in Hamburg—she said she stowed away in the steamship Gothland and disembarked at Leith.

The Court, unable to determine her nationality, decided she should be imprisoned pending a decision on deportation by the Home Office.
