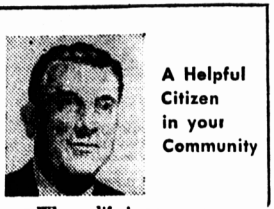

"THE WALLS OF JERICHO"

For absorbing entertainment with a strong romantic appeal, "The Walls of Jericho" is a "must" on everyone's list.
