

LIQUOREXPORTS FROM NFLD. NOT DESIGNATED

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTRÉAL, March 15—Production of customs records showing exports to the high seas by the Eastern Trading and Island Liquor Companies from St. John's, Newfoundland, was made today by Patrick J. Fahey, customs officer at St. John's, at the continued preliminary hearing of nine alleged members of a \$5,000,000 liquor conspiracy.

The nine before the court are the four Bronfman brothers, Samuel, Allan, Harry and Abraham, David Costley, F. S. Blair, Barney Aaron, of Montreal, and William Tulp and Mrs. Evelyn Carline, of Halifax.

Under reserve of objection by counsel for William Yule, documents were filed concerning with exports to the high seas from Newfoundland by the Island Liquor Company on the schooner Minnie May and by A. M. Robertson on the same vessel. The schooners, Monarchy, W. G. Robertson and Sarah Pauline, were also shown to have been used by the Island Liquor Company.

Convicted On Fraud Charge
