Wednesday morning there were only thirty six bags reported as having arrived in the city, and Tuesday's receipts were only about 400 bags. In car lots, on track, prime stock would sell at 90c., a bag. Jobbing prices are from \$1.00 to \$1.10, but no great quantity could be had at these prices. It is held by one merchant that the market will go still higher.
