## Moncton Comes From Behind To Defeat Truro Bearcats 9-5

MONCTON, N.B., Feb. 11.—(CP)—A furious third period drive that saw them score five goals without reply from their opponents tonight enabled Moncton Hawks to defeat Truro Bearcats 9-5 and take over leadership in the Maritime Senior Hockey League.

Hawks now are flying atop the loop with 51 points, compared with 49 for Bearcats, who have been winless in their last three games. Little Frank Imonit was a real sparkplug in the Hawk attack, although he only picked up two points, a goal and an assist. His goal at the four-minute mark of the third period enabled Hawks to tie the score and go on to win.

## S' side Wins Both Ends Of Twin Hockey Bill Last Evening

The doubleheader basketball bill staged at the P.W.C. Auditorium last night marking the opening of the second section of the City League, provided the fans with two of the most closely-knit games witnessed here since the league got underway.

Ray's Millionaires and Navy, the two winners had their work cut out for them every minute when competing against Saints and Prince of Wales squads and if last night's games can be taken as any criterion the second section of the league will turn out to be a battle right to the wire.

Hockey is at a low ebb locally this week due to the holding of the second Confederation Borspiel at the Forum, an event that promises some keen competition in the next couple of days—but starting next Saturday night when Prince of Wales and Navy tangle in the second game of their City League playoff series, the hockey faithful will have plenty of encounters to take up their attention.

On Monday night next the Moncton Hawks will make their appearance here against a team picked from the performers in the City Hockey League. The coupon that is running in this paper is attracting a lot of attention and already many tentative all-star lineups have been received with some of the players assured of a berth on the squad that will face the defending Maritime champions.

Tuesday night the two City school squads, West Kent and Queen Square meet in the second game of their best in three series for the C. F. Another trophy and night the juvenile league will hold forth, while Thursday Summerside All Stars clash with the Saints in the second game of their City League semi-finals.

Despite the one-sided defeat the Summerside team suffered a couple of weeks ago at the hands of the local University players, many fans are of the opinion that if they were to meet again they would still prove plenty tough. No doubt while it the Summerside team are far better than they showed on their last appearance here.

Just the other night in Summerside they proved that when they inflicted a 5-4 defeat on the intermediate Abbies, and if the squad can show the same type of play next Thursday night as they did on that occasion, Saints may be in for the toughest test they have yet experienced in local City League competition.

Speaking of the recent victory of the R.C.A.F. Flyers hockey team in the winter Olympic Games held at St. Moritz, Switzerland, the Ottawa Journal has the following:

"Canada today boasts its second Olympic championship, with the Royal Canadian Air Force hockey entry adding the hockey title to Barbara Ann Scott's skating triumph for the Dominion's only two victories at St. Moritz. But whereas Barbara Ann went over a prohibitive favorite to take the skating crown, the R.C.A.F. hopes weren't considered bright, though they were accorded increasingly better chances after some late revisions and acquisitions.

"In the end they appear to have surmounted more than the ordinary obstacles confronting a championship-bound hockey team on this side. There has been considerable criticism of the refereeing at St. Moritz, which is something experienced by many other touring Canadian teams in the past. Those with previous experience had expected some such developments, and were relieved and happy when it was all over and the team had survived.

"The Flyers' best effort all the way has been a praiseworthy one. They've maintained a fine balance from the start, combining strong attacking measures with stout defensive tactics. In this respect plenty of credit goes to goalie Murray Dowey, whose record of five goals against him in the entire tournament is indeed a most creditable one.

"There is a distinct Ottawa flavor to the triumph with Frank Boucher doing the coaching and a coterie of Ottawa boys members of
