A despatch from Boston says: Governor Foss has renominated Stephen O'Meara of Boston as police commissioner. The council has unanimously confirmed the selection. A newspaperman by profession, Mr. O'Meara was born in Charlottetown, P. E. I. July 26, 1854. When 10 years old he came to Charlottetown and was there educated in the public schools. He began newspaper work in 1872 on the Boston Globe, going to the Journal two years later, and there he worked his way by progressive steps to editor-in-chief and later publisher. He sold his interest in the Journal in 1902.

The death occurred in Santa Ana, Cal., on May 25, 1911, of Mrs. Marcella Rand Bynon, aged eighty years. She leaves four daughters and two sons who are: Mrs. Horace McPhee, Santa Ana; Mrs. H. M. In connection with the above notice it will be of interest to many here to learn that Mrs. Bynon's husband, who predeceased her by six years, was well known in the Maritime Provinces. He was at one time connected with newspaper work in Charlottetown, P. E. I., and left there to accept a position with the Frank A. Munsey Publishing Company. He was a newspaper man up to the time of his death. Mrs. Bynon was born in Shediac in 1830. She moved from Shediac to New York and from thence to California. Horace McPhee, a nephew and son-in-law of Ald. Rand, Moncton, is editor and proprietor of the Daily Evening Blade, at Santa Ana.

QUEBEC, June 1.—The Prince of Monaco is expected to pay a visit to Canada this summer when he will come out to see his friend Henri Menier, Mr. Henri Menier, known as the "Chocolate King" is the owner of the island of Anticosti, and will pay a visit to his possession down the Gulf this summer in order to look over the many works of improvement and development which are now in progress there. He will travel in his own private yacht, and later on the Prince of Monaco, will pay him a visit of some duration. Afterwards it is probable that they will make a brief tour of Canada prior to their return.

HIS DEATH A DAMPER

LONDON, June 1.—The death of King George's great-uncle, Prince John of Denmark, is causing modifications in some of the Coronation entertainments. The Duke of Devonshire's ball at Devonshire house last night was one of the most brilliant functions of the season. It was to have been graced by the presence of King George and Queen Mary, but owing to the death of Prince John the King did not attend and the Queen remained out for dinner, leaving before the dancing began. The Duke and Duchess of Connaught and several other members of the Royal Family attended the ball, however.

FRANCIS JOSEPH BETTER

GOEDOLLOE, Hungary, June 1.—Emperor Francis Joseph received in audience Count Kiven Von Hedervary the Hungarian Premier yesterday afternoon and entertained the Hungarian statesman at luncheon. The Emperor, whose appearance belied the recent scares published concerning his health, will leave the Royal Palace here today for the Austrian capital.
