Double the deficiency must be paid by the addressee if postage is underpaid. Avoid this embarrassment. Have a sample letter weighed at your nearest Post Office. One sheet of average lightweight Air Mail paper, and one lightweight Air Mail envelope, weigh 1/4 ounce or less. If you desire to keep within the 1/4 ounce limit, don't use more without checking the weight. Rate to British Isles, Eire and Europe is 15¢ per quarter ounce. See your Postmaster for Air Mail rates elsewhere.
