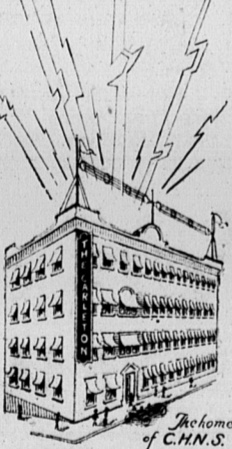

ly our area under potatoes could and would be extended with profit but for the handicap of sadly inadequate transportation. Were that handicap removed, the prosperity of our farmers would be expanded, every farm would be made vastly more valuable, money would flow in and merchants also would gather a golden harvest. But with the drawback of the narrow gauge, the lack of cars when urgently needed and the hold-up at the Capes, the otherwise bright prospects are dimmed.

The proceedings in Parliament have been quite overshadowed by matters of local interest nearer home of late, but the crimes and outrages committed in the Athabasca election two years ago, by the agents and appointees of the King Government, were so rank that their offensive odor has again invaded the Federal Chamber at Ottawa. It was a matter of ballot stealing in which the notorious Baldy Robb along with other miscreants was involved. He was caught, proven guilty, lightly punished and speedily released. His associates were officially sheltered. It was a disgraceful episode, the memory of which still rankles in the minds of all honest electors in the Athabasca country.

A further investigation before the Committee on Privileges and Elections has been decided upon. In the meantime the Government that has sheltered and retained in office not a few civil servants who were involved in the Athabasca outrage has dismissed from office between 300 and 400 honest and reputable postmasters throughout Canada on no better pretext than unproven charges of political partisanship.

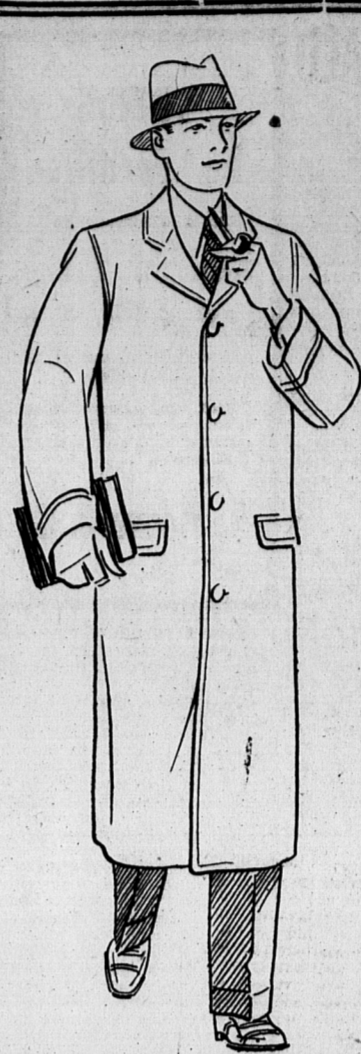


The Grand Orange Lodge Session Held At Hunter River
