Interesting Lecture At St. Dunstan's

An interesting and instructive lecture was given before the faculty and student body of St. Dunstan's University on Tuesday evening, November 29th, by Mr. J. J. R. H. Fleming, a member of the faculty. The lecturer chose for his subject, 'The British Empire. He showed in clear and concise manner how the Empire has developed to what it is today, what position it now holds in the world and the influence it exerts in maintaining world-peace. He briefly outlined the early history of the different Dominions and the rapid progress they have made since they came under the rule of Great Britain.

A hearty vote of thanks was moved by Mr. C. Tingley in which the appreciation of the students was voiced. It was ably seconded by Mr. J. Reddin. Then the Rev. J. A. Murphy, then in a few well chosen words congratulated Mr. Fleming on his excellent lecture and on the fact that he was the first member of the staff to offer an address of this kind to the students. He also expressed the hope that other members of the faculty would follow the example in the near future. Father Pitre's orchestra contributed greatly to the enjoyment of the evening's entertainment which was closed by the playing of the National Anthem.

Annual Meeting King's College Governors

The Annual Meeting of the Board of Governors of King's College was held in Halifax on Tuesday morning, November 29th. About twenty-five of the Governors were present. His Grace Archbishop Worrel was in the chair. Amongst other prominent clergy present were His Lordship Bishop MacKenley, Venerable Archdeacons Vroom and Armitage and Canon E. A. Harris from Nova Scotia. His Lordship Bishop Richardson, Canon Smithers, Rev. A. F. Bate and Rev. Thomas Parker from New Brunswick.

The President Rev. Dr. Moore presented a splendid report of the years work showing there are 76 students enrolled at King's. The President's report dealt also with the Building Campaign in an optimistic vein. It showed that the whole of the pledges for the campaign were paid in splendidly, but that some considerable amount was overdue and that it is absolutely necessary for the success of the campaign that these pledges be paid in full at once. The necessity of additional pledges was also stressed very strongly.

In the evening the Governors were the guests of the Halliburton Club at their bi-monthly meeting in the University, when two or three hours were pleasantly spent. During the evening a splendid address on Robert Browning was delivered by Mr. Andrew a student in residence and a son of Rev. A. E. Andrew, and also a very fine paper entitled "Nova Scotia as the fourteenth Colony" by Mr. Ross another student.

Mr. Harry Foster of this city took part in the Musical programme, while Mr. Stewart MacNutt was one of the hosts. Several of the Island students took part in the Annual College six mile road race last Saturday and all did well. All the Island students are enjoying good health and are now preparing for their Christmas examinations.

Telephone Co.'s Rates Changed MANY LONG DISTANCE RATES TO POINTS OUTSIDE, P. E. I. LOWERED.

In 1919 the majority of Telephone Companies operating in Canada and the United States adopted a uniform method of calculating rates for long distance telephone service. This method is known as the Classified Toll Rate

System. The schedule of rates used in connection with this system was considerably higher than that in effect in P. E. Island and for that reason the Prince Edward Telephone System, in the interests of its subscribers, did not adopt the system. In October, 1926, a new schedule of rates was put into effect under this system. This new schedule introduced many reductions in rates, and on December 1, 1926, further reductions were made, particularly on long haul messages, thus enabling this Company to fall

in line with almost all the other operating companies on the Continent, and to give its subscribers the benefit of the various features of this system. These features are: Station-to-Station service given when the calling person requests, and receives connection between his telephone and a specified telephone in an exchange outside of this province. This is the cheapest form of service, and will meet the needs of persons who may, for instance, wish to speak with a firm without reference to any particular member or employee of it. Person-to-Person service is that with which Telephone subscribers in the Province are familiar, covering the case where the calling person requests and receives connection with a specified person (as distinct from a particular telephone) in an exchange out of P. E. Island. The rate for this form of service is about 25 per cent higher than that for the station-to-station service. Messenger service, given when the calling person requests, and on the express stipulation that the recipient connection with a person called party will pay the charge for an exchange outside of P. E. Island. The rate for this form of service is about 50 per cent higher than for station-to-station service; the cost of the messenger is added to the distance service. Appointment service, given when the calling person requests, and on the stipulation that the recipient connection with a person called party will pay the charge for an exchange outside of P. E. Island. The rate for this form of service is about 50 per cent higher than for station-to-station service. The system also provides for reduced rates on Station-to-Station service during the day, and at night. The evening rate is effective from 7.00 to 8.30 p.m. and is about 75 per cent of the day rate, and the night rate is effective from 8.30 p.m. to 4.30 a.m.
