It is predicted that Ireland will soon have won in a great measure local self government.

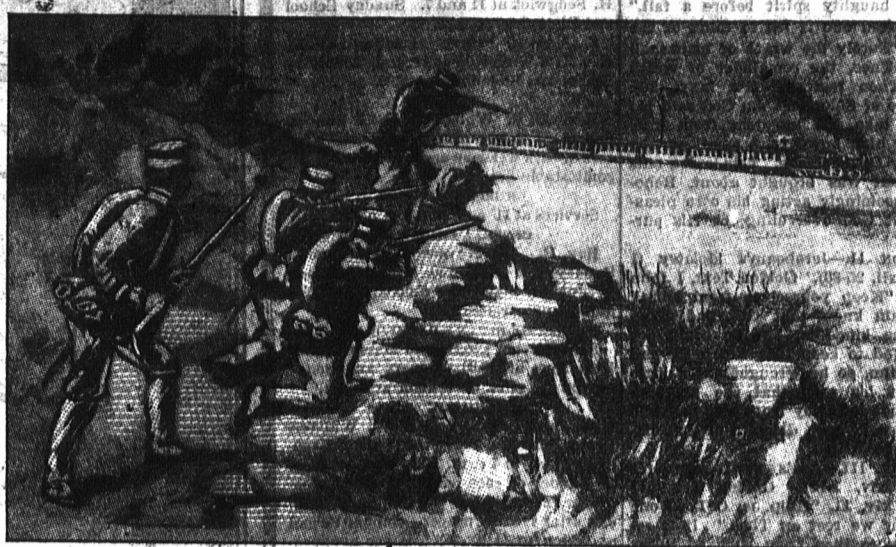
A FRIGHTFUL CASUALTY.

CINCINNATI, Sept. 23.—(Special)—A number of school children lost their

lives at Pleasant Ridge by the falling of a house. Nine bodies have been recovered. It is estimated that twenty five were killed.

THE COURTS.

CHANCERY, FRIDAY, SEPT. 23.

Henry Smith, Committee of Annie Lord, A Lunatic versus John A. Lord and others.

This was a case arising under the Partition Act and complainant prayed for a sale of 130 acres of land at Dunk River in Prince County formerly owned by the late Henry Taylor, who died intestate 17 years ago leaving a widow and four children. The widow married the defendant, John A. Lord and subsequently lost her reason.

Three of the heirs-at-law many years ago released their interest in the farm to their mother and it became necessary owing to her illness to sell it and the present action was instituted by her Committee-in-Lunacy to effect a sale. The defendants were her husband and her daughter Mrs. Leech of Boston who held the outstanding share. Mrs. Leech concurred in asking for a sale. The husband Lord through his Counsel thought if the farm was rented the complainant's support could be secured, although in his answer he claimed an interest in the farm. At the hearing he abandoned the claim and consented to expedite matters. The Master of the Rolls decreed that the farm should be sold.

BEFORE MR. JUSTICE HODGSON.

Immediately after the Lord Chancery case was concluded Mr. Johnston acting as Counsel for Angus Martin a prisoner in Queen's County Jail applied for a writ of Habeas Corpus for his discharge. Mr. Johnston read an affidavit of Martin from which it appeared that he was arrested in Charlottetown on the 2nd inst. by Bailiff Dover under a capias issued by Leonard Morris J. P. for Prince County at the suit of H. W. Turner, of O'Leary and committed to Queen's County Jail. The Capias was directed to the Sheriff of Queen's County and commanded him to arrest the defendant and in default of bail to commit him to the jail of your County. Bail not having been given the Bailiff obeyed the document and lodged the man in jail.

Mr. Johnston argued the Capias should have been directed to the Sheriff of Prince County, and that the defendant should have been lodged in the jail of that County, as provided by Sec. 36 of the County Court Act, and in no case can a J. P. for Prince County issue a Capias directed to the Sheriff of Queen's County. The Judge granted the writ of Habeas Corpus and the prisoner will be brought by the Jail or before the Court the first of the coming week.

MONTREAL, Sept. 21.—In addition to the \$50,000 gift by Lord Strathcona to the faculty of medicine at McGill, Principal Peterson yesterday announced that his lordship had expressed his intention of giving \$25,000 as a starter in a \$100,000 subscription list to erect a college gymnasium, and furthermore that Sir William Macdonald had also promised to give \$25,000.

DIED IN DENTIST'S CHAIR.

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 21.—Miss Lottie Borthwick, daughter of Thomas Borthwick of Hawthorne, and niece of ex-Mayor Borthwick of Ottawa, died today in the dental surgery of Graham & Beatty, as she had been given nitrous oxide as an anesthetic, preparatory to having a tooth pulled, and succumbed to its effects. The coroner made a report that Miss Borthwick died from an anesthetic accident, imputing blame to no body.

THE MARKETS.

Plums and apples, which are very plentiful this year, seemed to be the leading features at the market yesterday. Plums sold at 6 and 7c per qt. and apples 10 and 15c per pk.

Butter per lb in good demand brought 22 and 24c and eggs per doz. 17 and 18c.

The price of flour, Island, per cwt. was \$2.70 and oatmeal, per cwt. \$2.75. Hay per cwt remains about the same from 70.75c and \$13.50, pressed. Oats, black, per bus, sold at 37c and 35c for white. Straw per cwt was 40c and pressed \$7.00.

Wholesale price of potatoes was 20c per bus, retail, 35c and turnips per bus, whole sale, 12-16c, retail about 20c.

The price of vegetables was about the same as previous market. Tomatoes, 10 pk, sold at 15c.

Fowl brought from 50 to 65c a pair.
