Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family of any age over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, or certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in a vicinity.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.
Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, or certain conditions.
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take 2 purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Livestock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

THEFT CASE AT AMHERST GROWS INTERESTING

AMHERST, N. S.—The hearing of Ellsworth H. Southern of Moncton, will be held tomorrow morning before the Magistrate. Southern, who claims to be from Moncton, has been in Amherst for the past five months, an employee of the International Engineering Co. In yesterday's issue the story was given describing the escape from Mr. Mills and his subsequent recapture, after trying to make away with the tools from the Eastern Tool and Specialty Co. Last night the Chief of Police had a long talk with Southern who confessed a long series of petty thefts running in variation from Micrometers to Stationary Motors. Included were tools of all kinds and two bicycles. The accused talked freely although warned that against him he said would be used against him.
In addition to the thefts at the International and the Eastern Co., he confessed to taking carpentering tools from the new houses being built by Mr. P. C. Black and Mr. A. A. Barker. Then two bicycles were taken by him, one from a Mr. Purdy of Fort Lawrence and the other from Mr. Osborne Smith of Ormond's Drug Store. One of these he sold to Mr. Harley Oulton, the local dealer in bicycles; the other he had and it was stolen after he had concealed it. The tools were sent to Moncton for disposal in the Railway City and a local officer is now in that town endeavoring to trace the stolen goods. A number of other thefts is liable to come to light in this trial tomorrow.

ISLAND MINISTER GOES TO FAR OFF TIBET

REV. RODRICK A. MACLEOD, OF HARTSVILLE, WITH HIS WIFE GOING AS MISSIONARIES —FAREWELL SERVICES HELD
Love changes things, and that is why Miss Esther Evelyn Martin, of Bridgeport, Ill., is going to Tibet as a foreign missionary, the wife of Rodrick Alexander MacLeod, living link of the Seventh Christian Church. Miss Martin had decided to go to China as a messenger of glad tidings of great joy before she met Mr. MacLeod, however, and the thing that was changed in the plan was as to what field, under what board and at what time she would go.
Esther Evelyn Martin, daughter of Chas. H. and Rebecca A. Martin, was born at Lawrenceville, Ill., October 10, 1885. She attended the grade and high schools there and then went to Shurtliff College, Alton, Ill., where she received a Bachelor of Arts degree, and then to University of Illinois for post-graduate work; later she came to the College for Missions, Irvington, where she completed her training which so well fits her for the work she has chosen to do. She has taught high school and is an expert stenographer, having held some very responsible positions in this line of work.

How She Became a Missionary

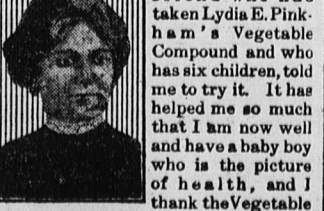
It was while she was doing office work in Chicago that she attended the Englewood Christian Church, of which Rev. C. G. Kindred is the pastor. From his preaching and influence, from missionary talks she heard at the Moody Bible Institute, and an interest aroused by working with Chinese while teaching in a Chinese Sunday school there, that she decided definitely to go as a missionary to China. She first became a member of the Christian church in Bridgeport, Ill., 16 years ago. There, too, she heard missionary talks, in fact, she says "I have always been interested in missions." It was at church, in Sunday school and in the Christian Endeavor Society that the spirit of missions first became interesting to her.
Her parents are now living in Bridgeport, Ill., and are perfectly willing for her to go. We mention this fact because there are instances of people going out for a great work but whose parents are not willing that they go. Both her sisters are married and her only brother is in the army now.
She looks forward to a very interesting and profitable work in Tibet where she intends to spend her life. The first part of her stay there will be spent in learning the language. Her experience and training received here will fit her especially for this work and no doubt this will not be a difficult task. She will learn to understand the people, their customs, and ways. She says "I will do whatever seems to be my part of the work of the Batang mission; whatever I may do that will advance the cause of Christ in Tibet." This is the spirit of a real missionary. There are many and varied duties there. This strong woman of splendid body and soul, a strong mind and charming personality who could do a great work in America if she chose, says, as we believe Christ would say, "I'll do whatever I can." What else could she say? She and her husband are well fitted for a work in the most needy field in the world, equipped as they are with the advantage all in their favor.
Mrs. MacLeod's native talent, her training and disposition, which has won for her among the college people and all who know her so many good loyal friends, will be of great service to the workers in the station in Batang. Her spirit, presence and personality will be a great asset. That a woman of her strong character and powers should decide for the mission fields speaks volumes for the cause of missions in this the homeland.
The people of the Seventh Christian Church are very proud to be able to have a part in Mrs. MacLeod's work, though she will be supported by a man and his wife in Akron, Ohio, yet she says, "I will always feel that I am partly supported, at least, by the Seventh Church, and I want to be a part of this church's living link."
All who have met Mrs. MacLeod join in the rejoicing that she is to be a part of their work and no doubt in the years to come many exchanges of letters will make even closer friends between her and the Seventh Church folk.
At the services Sunday evening, Mrs. MacLeod will, with her husband, say farewell for eight long years to the Seventh Christian Church, which will in turn remain faithful in "holding the ropes" while these people work in far away Tibet.

Edward Island, Canada, a full-blooded Scotchman. The son of a farmer, Mr. Duncan and Jessie MacLeod. He was born at Hartsville, March 31, 1885. His early religious training was received in the Presbyterian church where he committed to memory many choice passages of the Scriptures and learned the shorter catechism, which he can repeat to this day. His Bachelor of Divinity degree also from Yale in 1917. He has an exceptionally strong mind and his ability to learn language will be of great assistance to him in the new field where a great deal must yet be done in the way of reducing their language to writing. While in college he was a prominent member of the Sandwich Club, the "Hilokorean Literary Society and Y. C. A. He led the Honor Roll as a student, was manager of the Varsity baseball team and played two seasons as guard on the Varsity football team, the years, too, when they were state champions of secondary colleges. He was a member of the Student Volunteer band and in addition to his worked his way through college by preaching for churches a part of his time at the Olive Branch Christian church of this city, in all those churches he has a host of warm friends who are much interested in his work.

How He Became a Missionary

As is intimated above Mr. MacLeod is not unacquainted with the anxiety which comes into the hearts and lives of so many in America who are giving up their loved one for the great war. He has been in the East and in Canada lately and knows much about the deep sorrow there. His own brother is an officer in the Canadian division of the great army. He says, "I would gladly go if I could do so in the light of my present obligation. It is a supreme opportunity to be able to help make the world safe for democracy." He will bid farewell to

The change was cheerfully made by both boards and after he had spent a year in Yale he and Miss Martin were married in Bridgeport, June 25, 1917.

Just after the close of his work at Yale School of Religion he went to his home in P. E. I. where his father and mother still live for a farewell visit. His people are well pleased that he is going to this needy field where he can be of such great service to his Master. Mr. MacLeod is a strong man physically and mentally, he is held in the highest esteem by all who know him best and his acquaintances who are qualified to judge believe he will make a great missionary. Professor Paul says of him "He will make his mark in the world; we will bear great things from him unless I am badly mistaken."

He is well known in the Seventh Christian Church. As a companion and close friend of the pastor for several years he has preached often, supplied during vacation periods and taught in the church college for two years. The church is very proud that it can have a part in sending him to the field.
