Scrip Money To Go To Court

EDMONTON, Nov. 6—(CP)—Mr. Justice Frank Ford today said Supreme Court actions involving Alberta Government prosperity certificates must go on trial.

Validity of the scrip issue will be at stake in the trial which will also decide the right of the city of Edmonton to accept the certificates from the Government in lieu of cash relief grants. The ruling was made when court permission was given for changes in the statements of claim.

PRIVY COUNCIL WILL CONSIDER CANADIAN DEFENCE

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Evangelistic Meetings Are Largely Attended

Great interest was in evidence and a very fine spirit prevailed as the "Evangelization of Canadian Life" movement was introduced to the Protestant Laity of Summerside and district.

At the morning session held in Epworth Hall especially for ministers, a very interesting, inspiring and thought provoking conference was ably led by Rev. Mr. Miller, of Charlottetown. The fine Christian fellowship was enjoyed by all. A bright future for the Christian Church looms on the horizon as ministers of every Protestant Communion across Canada meet to pray and to plan together in their own districts, for the advancement of the Kingdom of God.

At the afternoon session held in the Presbyterian Hall, and largely attended by a cross section of the Laity a fine response was received as Mr. Miller again led in his very impressive manner. The evening meeting in the Presbyterian Church was well attended and was a blessing to all present as inspiring and challenging messages were heard from Rev. Mr. Hayter of Hazelbrook Baptist Church, and Rev. Mr. Miller of Trinity United Church, Charlottetown.

Rev. Mr. McCleary led in a fine opening song service.

A very impressive message in song was rendered by the ladies quartette of the Central S. Christian Church.

Rev. C. W. Wetherby was chairman of the meeting.—S.

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DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

The fastest mile of the season was made by Mildred May 2:04 1-2, owned by Sullivan and Mawhinney of Machias, Maine, and driven by Henry Clukey, when she won the first heat of the Junior Free-for-All at Fredericton in 2:05. The three fastest heats of the season in the Maritimes were paced by Bud Wenger 2:05 1-4 at Charlottetown in 2:05 3-4, 2:05 1-2, 2:06, winning the \$50 offered for lowering the track record.

The fastest mile trotted during the season was Heatherbell's 2:08 1/2 in the second heat of the 215 trot and pace at Montague, August 8th. It was also the fastest mile ever trotted by a Maritime owned horse on a Maritime track. Heatherbell's appearance in his sixth year of racing also marked the return to the track of Col. D. A. MacKinnon of Charlottetown, for years one of the leading horse owners and drivers in the Maritimes. Heatherbell won at Montague in July in 2:11 1-4, 2:11, 2:10 3-4, lowering the track record in every heat. He also lowered the track record at Charlottetown in September to 2:08 3-4.

The fastest mile trotted by a mare owned in the Maritimes was by Silk Girl 2:12 1-2 owned by Frank J. Murphy of Halifax and driven by Frank Boutlier, which trotted the first heat of the 215 trot at Charlottetown in 2:09 1-4, which is the fastest mile ever trotted by a mare in the Maritimes. Mr. Murphy was paid \$100 for lowering this record.

An outspan feature of the season was having among the fastest 2000 yds. races in New Brunswick. She was the fastest trotter of her color and was ridden by Col. D. A. MacKinnon. She started at Charlottetown in the 215 trot, which she won in 2:10 1-2, 2:10 1-4. Her second heat equalled the track trotting record and was also the fastest time ever made in the province by a trotter without a previous race record. She won at Fredericton in 2:11 1/2 from a field of seven and at Halifax in a field of ten.

A feature of the season was several Maritime records being broken by the younger horses. Guy Kalmuck, 2 years, by Kalmuck, owned by George Lewis of Charlottetown and driven by Willard Kelly, at a public trial in October at Charlottetown against time, trotted a mile in 2:22 1-4 to lower the two-year-old trotting record, and to make the fastest time by any Maritime-bred of that age. Previous to that Nita Volo by Pax Volo, owned

ed by H. O'Brien, Alberton and driven by C. O'Brien, lowered the record for Maritime-bred two-year-old pacers to 2:23 1-2, formerly 2:24. The two-year-old colt Bud Volo, owned by O'Brien and Barbour, entered the 230 list with a record of 2:25 1-4.

Guy Ann, owned by George Callbeck, Summerside, reduced the race and pacing record for Maritime-breds, three-year-olds, when she won in 2:16 1-2 at Charlottetown. Letta Kelmuck, owned by Blair Andrews, New Glasgow, P.E.I. and piloted by Willard Kelly, was the fastest four-year-old Maritime-bred pacer in 2:14 1-4, lowering that record. Rossbud, owned by A. H. Murphy, Charlottetown, was the fastest four-year-old Maritime-bred filly in 2:19 1-2.

Lusty Frisco 2:07 3-4, owned by C. H. Chandler, Charlottetown, and driven by Fred Cameron, was not only the fastest trotting stallion of the year with his mile at Charlottetown in 2:11, but he lowered the trotting record for the Summerside track to 2:14.

Soviet, owned by Andrew Perry, Summerside, was the fastest stallion to enter the 230 list with a record of 2:12 at Alberton. Alset, owned and driven by Robert Vickers, Sydney Mine, lowered her record four times and was the fastest Maritime-bred trotter to enter the list this season in 2:13. Hal Boojum owned by Dr. E. M. Johnston of Great Village, N.S., was the fastest Maritime-bred stallion in 2:17 3-4. Balbo, owned by Alex. McLean, Montague, with his mile in 2:15 was the fastest Maritime-bred gelding to enter the 230 list. Pucky Scott 2:09, owned by the Sumpe Stables, Kensington, P.E.I. reduced his half-mile record to 2:08 1-4.

In this issue you will notice a letter for sale the two pacers Day Bomber, 2:09, and Hanover Courier, 2:09, that raced so well throughout the Maritimes the past season. Billy Bomber won at Charlottetown so handsily in 2:09 that it looked as though he could do better. He won several other races, which is an excellent showing considering he had only arrived from Ohio in June. Hanover Courier, 2:09, was seen to better advantage at Summerside, where he lowered the track record to 2:12. He won a great race at Woodstock earlier, beating some real cracks including Dolly Azoff, 2:07. The price asked for these young horses is very reasonable, and anyone looking for a good race prospect will find it difficult to secure better.
