Fears Extinction Of Celtic Culture

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 26 — Celtic culture faces extinction, Prof. John L. Gerig of Columbia University declared here in an address 120 under the auspices of the American Celtic Society. "Today we are appalled as well as mystified by the disappearance of the rich and varied Maya civilization which flourished centuries ago in Central America and which has left us as its sole symbol of glory imperishable architectural monuments of rare beauty," Prof. Gerig said. "And yet under our own very eyes an even more wonderful culture—that of the Celts—which draws its sources from the mists of antiquity, is being threatened with extinction, and we do not seem to be aware of it."

IT RAINS WILD GEESSE

ELGIN, Man., April 26—Fifty-two large wild geese were killed by a lightning flash during an electrical storm here today and citizens are looking forward to goose dinners. Lightning was seen to strike into a large flock of the birds while they were passing over the town and 52 tumbled to earth. They were picked up and distributed among the townsmen.

FIVE NOBEL PRIZES

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, April 26—There will be five Nobel prize awards this year. Literature, medicine and chemistry will carry one award each, with two for physics, the 1931 award for physics having been carried over. The funds for the Nobel Foundation now exceeds 45,000,000 kroner (normally \$11,835,000) and the amount of each prize will be 171,713 kroner (normally \$45,171). Depreciation of the Norwegian exchange, however, may reduce the value of the prize (approximately a fifth down at present) in terms of dollars.
