The Illegal Fishing And Sale of Trout OTTAWA, May 4, 1925. — The following article re the sale of trout speaks for itself: His Excellency the Governor General in Council: Whereas the Minister of Marine and Fisheries reports that the Fish and Game Protection Association of Prince Edward Island, as well as the Tourists' Association of that Province urge that with a view to preventing illegal fishing for trout, which is the most valuable sport fish of the Island, the sale thereof be prohibited, and that the responsible officers of the Department of Marine and Fisheries, who deal with the administration of the fisheries, concur in this proposal. Therefore His Excellency the Governor General in Council, on the recommendation of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries and under the authority of section 45 of the Fisheries Act, Chapter 8 of the Statutes of 1914, is pleased to order that subsection 4 of section 19 of the said fishery regulations for Prince Edward Island, which were adopted by Order in Council of April 26th, 1922, be and the same is hereby rescinded, and the following substituted therefor: 4. The sale, purchase or export of speckled trout, no matter where procured, is prohibited, provided, however, that any non-resident fishing in waters of the Province may upon leaving the Province take away the lawful catch of two days' fishing, if the shipment is accompanied by a certificate to that effect from either the local fishery officer in whose district the fish were caught, or from the local station agent adjacent to the locality in which they were caught.
