**King Will Honour Premier Lloyd George**

(Special to The Guardian.)

LONDON, July 24.—King George is eager to bestow an honor on Premier David Lloyd George in recognition of his services in the war and at the peace conference and the form of the order is being discussed in court circles, says the Mirror.

Premier Lloyd George would not accept a peerage the newspapers assert while knighthood of the garter, which is the highest honor in the Sovereign's gift, is practically confined to peers, although an exception was made in the case of Sir Edward Grey in 1912.

The Mirror suggests that if the Grey precedent is followed some special honor may be created.

**NURSES HOLIDAYS.**—Matrons and nurses in the service of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment, will in future be granted leave of absence for two weeks in every six months. Ordinarily, the Civil Service allowance for holidays makes provision for eighteen days holidays in a year. This extension has, however, been made for those on nursing staff in view of the arduous nature of their duties.

**MILITARY MATTERS.**—In future all officers and soldiers of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who have been transferred to the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment for medical care, shall be counted, for the purpose of payment of war service gratuity to be still upon active service until the time of their complete discharge from the strength of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment. This will work out so that at the conclusion of treatment the gratuity pay shall be computed upon the length of military service, plus the entire period of medical treatment. This ruling will apply to all officers and men coming within the scale of gratuity payments who have since February, 1918, or who may hereafter be retired or discharged from either the military or naval forces.

**FAIRVIEW.**—There will be preaching service in Fairview Baptist church next Lord's Day evening at 7 p.m. (old time.) Rev. G. W. Ford will be the preacher. Mr. Ford is pastor of the Church of Christ at East Machias, Maine. Mr. Ford and family are spending their vacation on the island visiting friends and relatives.

**SHIPPING BERRIES.**—Mr. E. J. Lumsden, Murray Harbor, is hustling these days since the cultivated berries have been in demand. Last week he made three trips by schooner from Montague to New Glasgow, handling in over \$2,000 worth of the choice product raised by Mr. McIntyre and others of Montague and vicinity.

**AN ISLAND CLERGYMAN.**—The Halifax Mail says: Rev. L. E. Aeky had a warm welcome from his old flock of the Baptist Temple on Sunday—he was looking very well indeed, and obviously the pleasure at meeting again was mutual. Next Sunday the congregation are to have with them one of the very strongest of the younger ministers in the Baptist denomination in these provinces—Rev. Mr. Warren, of Fredericton.

**C. G. S. PRINCESS.**—Says the North Sydney Herald: The first appearance in this port of the steamer Princess, which formerly was engaged on the route between Pictou and Charlottetown, but now owned by Farquhar & Company, of Halifax, was last Friday. The Princess draws a government subsidy of \$12,000 from the Federal Government to drop off mail at Ingonish and St. Paul's Island. She is engaged on the same route as the Seal used to cover, sailing between North Sydney and on the Newfoundland coast as far down as Boone Bay. She is a nicely equipped craft, being especially built for the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Co. (now defunct) for the service between the Island capital and Pictou, and was one of the best ever engaged in that service.

**Rat Plague in England.**

London and the other great cities of England would pay willingly today the demands of modern Piper of Hamelin who would relieve their warehouses from the present plague of rats.

Marsh rats have increased lately by millions, and a great migration is in progress from the country to the town, and the loss arising from damage by rats is piling up rapidly.

While a portion of the increase is due largely to the war and the absence of preventive measures, there is no doubt that the regulation prohibiting rat baiting is the main cause for the present condition.

William Jones, the well-known London rat catcher, stated that before the order prohibiting rat baiting was made it was worth his while to spend a night or two on the marshes outside London for a bag of 300 live rats, which would find a ready market on Sunday morning at Clun, now Spitalfields, at eight cents apiece.

Since the prohibiting this rat catcher has sought his livelihood in established buildings, where his attentions may be occupied for several days in clearing out a mere handful of rodents. He estimates the annual loss to the country from rats' depredations at more than \$25,000,000.

The City of London Corporation has just appointed an inspector of vermin, with powers to take all measures to cope with the plague.
