The contents of the terrariums, for which the Bessborough Shield is to be awarded this year should be collected in September and it was suggested that a prize be given in each county, the three winners to be shown at the annual meeting of the Provincial Council.

A report from the committee on Cookie Day, from which the Provincial Council wishes to raise \$500, showed that it would be necessary to sell 10,000 cookies, or each Guide and Brownie must sell ten packages.

Another interesting report was that permission had been granted to have a Guide shelf in the Public Library, which should be of great assistance to both Guides and Guiders.

It was announced that the Brownie Shield for the pack during the year would be awarded during Guide-Scout Week each year.

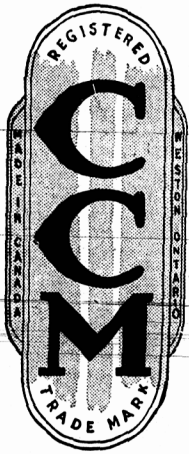

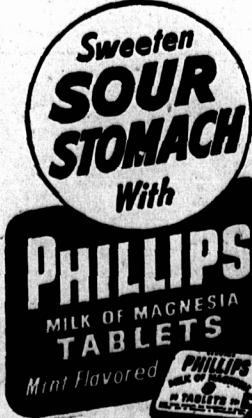
