Some Early Chapters In The History Of Tryon United Church

A LULL IN CHURCH WORK

For a period of several years following 1794 we have no account of Methodist or Presbyterian activities in Tryon. In fact for six or seven years following this date, no preacher of the Methodist communion visited the Island. In the conference report of 1798 even the nominal return of membership for the Island had been dropped, but we may be certain that Nathaniel Wright kept the flame of religion burning brightly even though weakly at times.

In 1801 Conference reported 814 members in the lower provinces of which 20 are credited to Prince Edward Island. In June of this year, Thomas Dawson, the first of a name ever since prominent in Methodist circles, immigrated to

Prince Edward Island, settling at the head of Hillsboro River. He was a local preacher of no mean ability with that fervour and sense of duty which led him to consider "the Island his parish" to paraphrase one of Wesley's sayings. He preached regularly at Charlottetown generally walking both ways, the not untiring distances of 24 miles. Smith writes: "Provided with a pocket compass and often guided by blazed paths he frequently found his way to Lot 40, Cherry Valley, Vernon River, Murray Harbor, St. Peter's and Three Rivers. It is said that no settlements in the Island remained unvisited by him." From which we may conclude that Tryon heard several sermons from the first earnest servant of the Lord. In passing we may note his eldest son Samuel Edward later married a daughter of John Lord Esq. and settled in Tryon. His descendants were out-

standing in Methodist circles, among whom we may mention the late Rev. John L. Dawson, a former pastor of Trinity United Church in Charlottetown. Thomas Dawson prematurely worn out in this strenuous pioneer service passed away in 1805.

In the census of 1798 Nathaniel Wright is listed in Lot 28 the head of a household of seven but towards the close of the century or in the early dawn of the nineteenth, he moved to Bedeque, "and here also meetings were established in which two or three often met together for prayer and Christian communion."

An Antimonian preacher came to Tryon shortly after Black's visit (one is not sure what an antimonian preacher but he apparently wasn't orthodox) and drew away several from the Society. Nathaniel Wright and others however, remained steadfast in their faith, which was much strengthened by discourses Mrs. Wright had heard in Charlottetown from Joshua Newton, Esq. who had charge of a class of six or seven which met at Benjamin Chappell's. She told these to her husband on her return and thus confirmed in his beliefs as they had been revealed to him by Grandin and Black Nathaniel Wright and the tiny handful of folk called Wes-

Jeyan Methodists continued nourishing the seed of which was to spring a large number of Prince County United churches.

FIRST RESIDENT MINISTER

After the death of Thomas Dawson, Tryon had no ministerial aid from the outside world till the first resident Methodist clergyman Rev. James Bulpit was appointed to Prince Edward Island in 1807. Soon after his arrival he reported the number of members in the Society as fifty of whom fifteen were in Charlottetown, which he made his headquarters. In addition to a "lively" people at Murray Harbour there were also good congregations in Bedeque and Tryon. Mr. Bulpit continued as minister to the large Island circuit up till 1814 when his name appeared on the minutes of conference as a supernumerary. During this period of 1807-1814, other of the Methodist clergy visited the Island at infrequent intervals. In the spring of 1810 John Black visited the Island, preaching to overflowing congregations at several places; and John Knowlan in the fall of the same year spent two or three weeks preaching at Charlottetown and elsewhere.

Up to this time Tryon and Bedeque were not regular preaching

appointments of the Charlottetown circuit but Mr. Bulpit's immediate successor—Rev. John Hick who arrived in August 1815 visited them regularly. A society of six persons was established at Bedeque in this year by Mr. H. Ck. H's stay on the Island was short being appointed to Montreal the next year and was succeeded by John B. Strong who preached in Prince County every six weeks. His first sermon at Bedeque was preached in Nathaniel Wright's barn. In December of 1816 meetings were held at Tryon and Bedeque by Mr. Strong in regards to the erection of Wesleyan Chapels in the respective communities. Plans were made and the spring and summer of 1817 saw the erection of Tryon's first little church on the same site as the present United Church stands, the land was a donation from John Lord Esq. One can not well imagine the difficulties under which the pioneers battled. Building a church in 1817 following the crop failures of the previous season may well be written as a deed of those possessed of a faith that moves mountains. The year 1816 goes down in history "as the year without a summer." There was but little rain, the prevailing winds were northerly and the heavy snow in many parts of the Maritimes in

June followed by early September frosts resulted in the destruction of nearly all the grain crops. So we may understand that though the exterior of the church was completed in 1817 it was several years before the interior was fully furnished, involving as it would comparatively large expenditure for the little handful of Lot 28 church folk. The year that Tryon erected its first little chapel is also memorable in that at the district meeting of the same year Tryon and Bedeque were constituted a separate circuit the Rev. John Fishpool being appointed pastor. He at once interested himself in the completion of the church and taking advantage of an exchange of pulpits in the autumn with Rev. Thomas Payne, of Wallace, N. S. (later to be incumbent of the Tryon-Bedeque circuit) he visited other districts of Nova Scotia from which he secured money and materials for preparing the church for winter use.

GIFT OF PULPIT

The pulpit in the first little chapel was a generous donation from an elderly Roman Catholic priest, Father Fitzgerald a Franciscan who was stationed on the Island for some little time. When Rev. Wm. Temple was at Charlottetown in

1828-29 Father Fitzgerald informed him that he had known John Wesley "very well." Mr. Temple has left on record for us: "Father Fitzgerald is a liberal man. He built the pulpit in our chapel at Tryon at his own expense, and offered me twenty shillings toward a bell for our chapel here (Charlottetown) as he thought we ought to have one." The Tryon church building was the third sacred edifice of the Methodists erected on the Island, being preceded by smaller churches at Murray Harbor and Charlottetown. Not till 1818 did Bedeque erect their church as previously planned.

EARLY SETTLERS ARRIVE

At Tryon, Bedeque, and vicinity several newly immigrated families

from England were welcome additions to Prince County Methodism in 1817. Among these we may mention John and Wm. Pope of Bedeque, prominent as local preachers the former of whom later entered the regular ministry. Also Richard Hudson of Tryon and George Wigginton of Crapaud efficient local preachers and class leaders, just two of a band of sturdy Yorkshire settlers who came to P. E. I. in June 1817 and of whom a fair number settled in Tryon and Crapaud.

In 1818 Rev. J. B. Strong who was stationed at Charlottetown and Mr. Fishpool exchanged circuits. The report from Tryon and Bedeque in 1818 was indicative of spiritual success. Writing regarding difficulties
