RED CROSS SOCIETY.—A meeting of the Prince Edward Island branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society was held in the Law Courts building yesterday afternoon, the President Mr. Justice Hazard, in the chair. Among those present were: Mr. F. R. Heartz, (Vice-President), Lieutenant Governor Rogers, Mrs. Rogers, Mrs. Doull, Miss Weeks, Miss Williams, Miss Sweeney and Miss Gay. Telegrams were read from the Central Society requesting that committees be formed for the purpose of collecting funds. It was decided that a request be made persons to become members of the society, and that subscriptions should be asked for providing assistance to the sick and wounded at the front in the present deplorable emergency. All subscriptions are to be made payable to Mr. Percy Pope, treasurer, and due acknowledgment of monies received will be made in the press from time to time. Miss Laura May Gay, a graduate nurse of Newport, Mass., 1913, Miss Edith Williams, Ellerslie, a graduate nurse of the P. E. Island Hospital, 1913, volunteered to go to the front as nurses. Mrs. Ledwell, who has considerable experience in nursing also offered her services. These ladies are to be commended on having so early in the war entered such a true British spirit. the "unwritten law" verdict, and in most civilized countries, the woman who has suffered certain wrongs or been ill-treated by man, derives the benefit of such circumstances if she retaliates; nevertheless some sort of punishment is meted out. The moral standpoint is that, "when the courts of justice come under the malign and blighting influence of politics, then indeed, there is little hope of justice as between the tribune of the people and one of the people themselves. The Times, curiously comment, perhaps because of this juncture it felt that England should not say anything to the detriment of a nation which it may be called upon to support in the face of Europe tomorrow.
