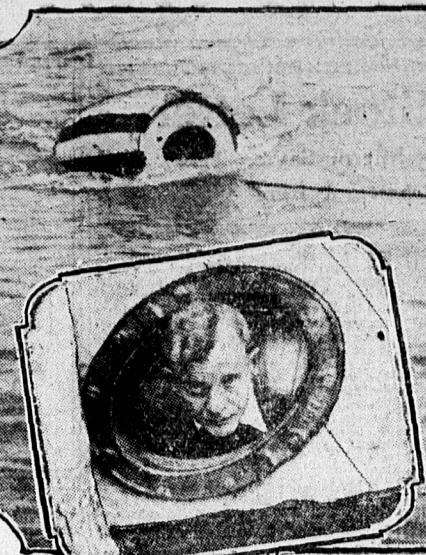

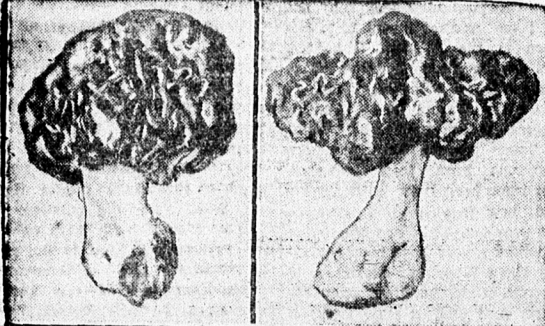
ENTRAPPED INVELMAN IMPRISONED IN BARREL RESCUED FROM NIAGARA WHIRLPOOL BY PLUCKY YOUNG SON

Flowed to a point in the lower river below Horseshoe Falls, Niagara Falls, Ont., on Saturday, May 30, and released. Wm. "Red" Hill, veteran riverman, was swept in a barrel through the Niagara rapids to the whirlpool, from which he was rescued, after three hours' drifting in the maelstrom, by the plucky action of his 18-year-old son, William, Jr., who swam back into the barrel to continue his trip down the river on Sunday. "FALSE MOREL" SUSPECTED OF KILLING TWO

Stanley and Ellen Ross, aged 8 and 11, children of Searchmont, north of Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., are dead and poisonous mushrooms found by the two in the bush are claimed to be the cause. Other children are ill, supposedly from the same cause. Common morel (LEFT) is edible when young and when mature has a bad odor. Gyromitra, or "false morel," which the children are supposed to have eaten, is deadly poisonous when dead or deteriorated, although they can be eaten fresh after pan-broiling. The true morel has but one cavity through stem and cap, but the "false morel" has more than that.



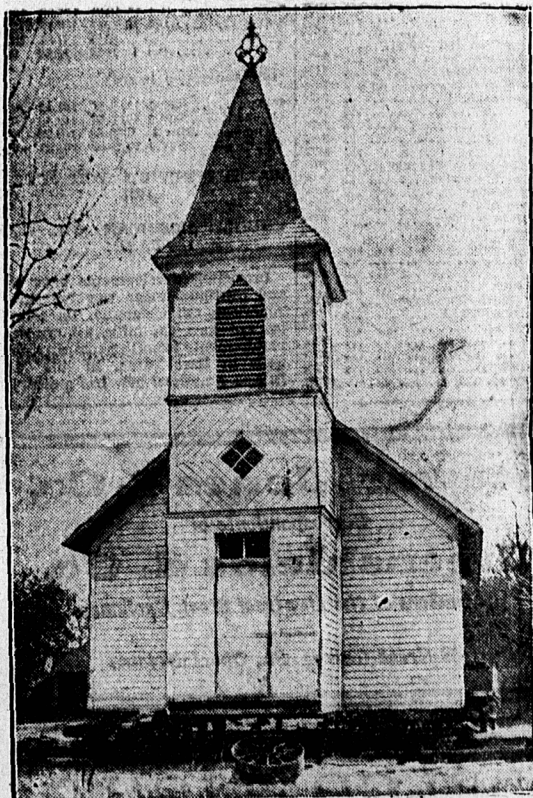

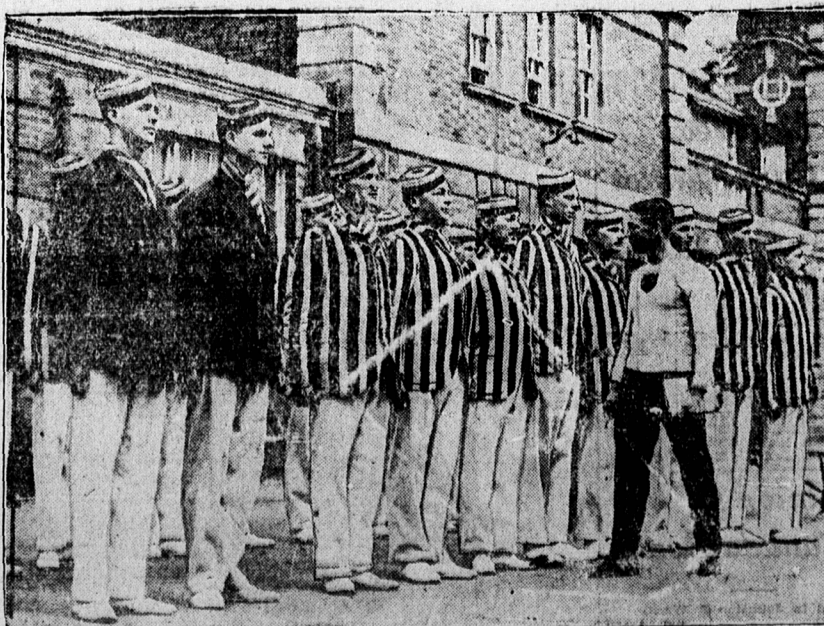
PICKS LUCKY TICKET
