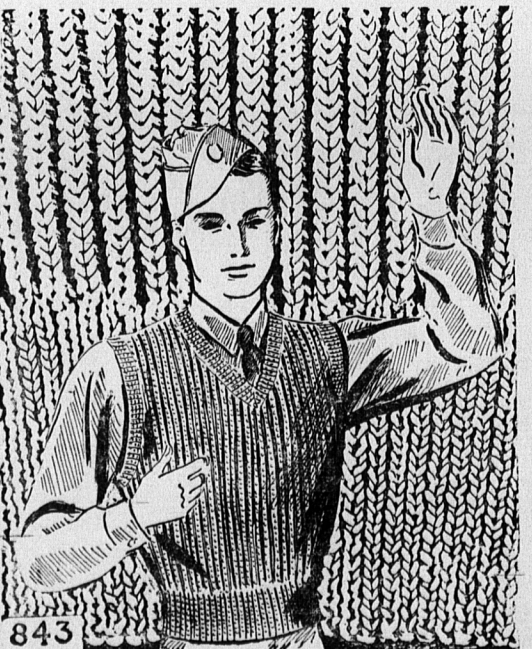
REJUVENATE BRASS

Fabric and Rods Make "Cornice"

Curtains topped with a cornice do have an elegant look. The nicest part about these lovely draperies, though, is that the "cornice" is of fabric, just stitched on to two rods! A trick you can easily do yourself. You might combine side draperies of burgundy sateen printed in an ivory figure with a cornice of plain ivory—or a plum-colored chintz with a green figure and a green cornice.

To make the cornice, start with a strip of lining 50 per cent. longer than the window is wide. Make rod castings and then face this lining with your ivory sateen, binding neatly along bottom and top edges.

To side draperies and glass curtains too, you can easily give a professional look.

In cutting glass curtains, straight-end fabric by pulling a thread; then curtains won't hang askew. In lining draperies, let drapery material project 1/4 inch beyond lining, so lining won't show.
