Sponsors Railway For The Peace River District

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 21. - The transportation of the grain growers homesteading in the northern districts of the Canadian prairie provinces will, it is claimed, be considerably lessened if the project which "General" Frank A. Sutton is sponsoring is brought to fruition. His plan is to construct a line of railway westwards, parallel to the Peace River in Alberta, into British Columbia where the line will turn southwards to connect up with the British Columbia government road, the Pacific Great Eastern, at Quesnel. In this way, "General" Sutton hopes to divert an enormous amount of traffic at present travelling eastwards, to Vancouver. And, should he succeed, his project would bring considerable additional business to the Panama Canal.

The scheme is no less interesting than the personality of the promoter himself. "General" Sutton is an Englishman who served in the Great War with the rank of temporary lieutenant. He was wounded, a casualty which necessitated the amputation of his right arm. He continued to serve in administrative capacity until the close of the war when he was demobilized. However, in spite of his disability, he was still a soldier, and the next that he heard of him was at the Manchuria, where he rose in the service of Chang Tso Ling to be practically his chief military advisor. He left the Manchurian warlord last year with the rank of "General", and the virgin lands of that western province, with all their wealth in timber and minerals, attracted him. "General" Sutton devoted himself to exploration and exploitation of British Columbia's resources, and became interested in the agitation of the farmers of the Peace River district in Northern Alberta for an outlet to the sea. To this project he is now devoting his abilities, with what success remains to be seen.

A "Peace River Railway" has often been mooted, and at the moment that district is served, with an eastward haul, by the Edmonton and Dunvegan railroad, "General" Sutton now proposes to join up the terminals of this line, Whittier, on the coast of the Peace River, and Spirit River (a point south of that river) and loop his own railway on both sides of the Peace River westwards toward Hudson's Hope, in British Columbia. From that point across the Rocky Mountains the line would run south via the Crook River to Quesnel, crossing the line of the Canadian National Railway at Prince George.

The difficulty at present, according to "General" Sutton, is that, while the province of British Columbia looks favorably on the plan and is willing to grant him concessions in the way of free land now interested in hauling the products of the Peace River Valley east and south on its own line, is unwilling to concede much in the way of land grants.

However, "General" Sutton is prepared to purchase the necessary land if Alberta will name a reasonable price. In England, according to the "General", a group of financiers is interested in the scheme and is prepared to back
