—PARISH OF ALBERTON, P. E. I., REV. E. T. Mackerel Fishing Makes a Record

HALIFAX, July 4.—It is estimated by local fish men that mackerel to the value of over a million and a half dollars were taken along the Nova Scotian coast between Halifax and Yarmouth this Spring and summer. It is said that if the present run of fish continues the figure will reach the two million mark. One coast fisherman described the present season as the "best one on our coast for fifteen years."
There is said to be also good runs of Haddock and Pollock. The lobster reports, however, shows small catches of this fish.

prayers will follow you wherever you may labor.

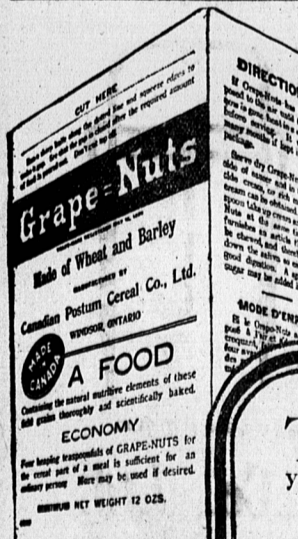
PREM. LENINE IS FARMING
