

Republican Colors For Military Buildings

Berlin, Sept. 3.—Minister of Defense Gessler has issued a decree providing that military buildings as well as private residences of members of the army, when occasion arises, display Republican colors. The decree further provides that ribbons carried by soldiers in funeral processions shall be Republican colors.

The order of the Defense Minister refers to a recent "unpleasant public controversy over the flag question, in which some Republican newspapers maintained that members of the Reichwehr always ignored the new flag, ostentatiously displaying the former imperial colors.

Wealth Won In Swimming

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 7.—Vierkotter averaged 48 strokes to the minute during the Marathon swim on Aug. 31.

In the 11 3/4 hours he was in the water, he made some 33,840 strokes. He won \$30,000. His strokes were worth about 90 cents apiece. Michel, the Frenchman, who came in second, swam about 32 strokes to the minute in a different style. He made 32,000 strokes in his 16 hour swim. His prize of \$7,500 made each stroke worth less than 25 cents.

75 Mile Pittsburgh Race Won By Baker

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 7.—Joe Baker of McKee's Rocks, Pa., won the 75-mile race on the half-mile Bridgeville speedway Monday, making the grind in one hour and one minute and 31 seconds.

Jack Casey, of Pittsburgh, raced across the line first in the 25-mile event. His time was 25 minutes and 25 seconds.

Sammy Swank, of Akron, Ohio, took second honors in both races. Casey was third in the 75-mile event, while William Stitzel, Pittsburgh, captured third place in the smaller race.



Prizes Awarded Chief Swimmers In Toronto Contest

TORONTO, Sept. 3.—The huge grandstand at the Canadian National Regatta was crowded to capacity this afternoon as the prizes in the swimming Marathon of Wednesday were awarded to the winner, second and third men, and to the four women who stayed in the water longest.

Ernest Vierkotter was all smiles as he was handed a small trophy of blue paper, representing his \$30,000 and he thanked the officials and the crowd through amplifiers. Lottie Schoemmel received \$3,500, or more than any other woman. She said she was going to buy a house for her mother. She remarked that her manager had entered into negotiations for a 1,000-mile relay swim down the Mississippi River.

Georges Michel, the runner-up, received his \$7,000 and Bill Erickson, \$2,500. Ethel Hurtle, of New York, who received \$3,000 said her money was going toward a home for her father and mother on Long Island. She had not picked the location yet. Incidentally she was going home "to make pies for my Dad."

"In a little while I hope I can get a job as swimming instructor in one of the schools," she added. Edith Hedlin, of Toronto, was going to send her \$2,000 to her mother in Finland.

GHOST WINNER OF BOTH YACHT RACES LABOR DAY

Labor Day morning and after the moon gave the yachtmens all that was desired in weather conditions for fast yacht racing and the small crafts showed they were able to stand up to it.

For the morning race four boats came out to take the word, Ghost, Lund and Smith, Minnigoo, J. Pincen and G. Essory, P. No. J. King and A. Campbell, Zenith, E. McInnis and E. Flynn.

The four boats got away bunched at 10.55 over the course from stake boat to Rosebank number three, passing inside stake boat, to Park buoy, twice around, which was completed in one hour flat being won by the Ghost with a good margin over the Minnigoo, Zenith third and P. No. fourth.

In the afternoon only three boats came out for the second race of the day, the Zenith, E. McInnis Sr. and E. McInnis Jr., Minnigoo, J. Pincen and G. Essory, Ghost I, Lund and G. Smith.

The boats got away at 3.03 over a course from stake boat to Rosebank number three to North River and stake boat, twice around and was again won by the Ghost by five minutes over her closest rival the Ghost, the Zenith finishing about four minutes later, the time for this course being one hour and eighteen minutes.

The Ghost pulled into the lead on the run to Rosebank, increasing her lead until the tack to North River buoy on the last leg of the course when the "Goo" started to gain but was only able to cut down the lead by three quarters of a minute.

Many of the spectators present on Labor Day claim it was the nicest race of the season, although the winner had a wide margin in the breeze and heavy sea making quite a tiring race.


