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**"EX-PRIME MINISTERS HAVE NO PULL"**

Alexander Smith, for a long time a practicing barrister in Ottawa, was a friend of everybody. He was prominent in the Liberal party, and until his death in October, 1923, was "guide, philosopher and friend" to ministers and members of his own political stripe. Just the same he knew more of the inner workings of both parties than most men not in official life. Out of session he was a regular evening habitue of the old Russell House, and there it was that the newspaper men would gather round to hear Alex's reflections on men and things in general.

Sitting with him one night he told us a good story which I think is worth repeating. John P. Wood, who represented the old riding of Brockville for many years, passed away in 1899, and necessarily there was a by-election. The Liberal candidate was W. H. **Montreal To Help Unemployed**

MONTREAL, March 9.—(C.P.)—Free medical care and free electricity to unemployed, with 25 per cent larger contribution for rent, will be supplied by the city of Montreal, Mayor Camillien Houde announced in a speech today.

A one-year loan of \$1,800,000 has been obtained from the city bankers to allow the additional expenditures which go into effect of May 1, the Mayor said, addressing Le Front Populaire. The expenditure will be borne by Montreal alone, he added, pending further efforts to have all relief costs lifted from the municipalities and absorbed by Dominion and Provincial Governments.

The money was obtained from the Bank of Montreal and Banque Canadienne Nationale and would be used: \$850,000 additional rent for unemployed; \$550,000 for free medical care, and \$300,000 for free electricity, for one year.
