THE BALDWIN'S ESTATE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 20—At the trial of the "Lucky Baldwin" will case today, Mrs. Lillian Turnbull, of Boston, was the star witness in the contest of her daughter Beatrice Anita Turnbull to obtain a \$2,500,000 share of the late Elias J. (Lucky) Baldwin's \$11,000,000 estate. Mrs. Turnbull came into court with her brother Everett P. Ashley, a hotel keeper of Woodstock (Conn.) Her daughter, the seventeen year old plaintiff, was not present. When Mrs. Turnbull took the stand, Attorney Gavin McNab, the cross examiner, at once began the attack, reading to the jury one of a series of letters written, it was claimed, by Mrs. Turnbull in 1889, which relates to the correspondence with Baldwin. It was addressed to "Louis Leach," and was as follows: "I was born and raised in Vermont, love horses almost to distraction, am twenty years old, alone in the world, my own mistress, and have to earn my own living. Saw your name in the 'Horseman' in connection with the great international running race. As I want to have a horse-loving friend in California to secure me a nice position, also further my interest in various ways, so that I can go there in the near future, I have written you. My eastern prince is Wesley P. Balch, but as I am going to California to live, for a while shall need a 'count' on the Pacific coast. Now if you are a whole-souled youth with the 'ducat,' good figure, and fair looking face, write me and inclose photograph and on receipt of same will tell you more about yours truly. 'Miss L. A.
