## Maritime Trade Board Concludes Annual Meeting

### Resolutions Adopted Yesterday Morning. Mr. N. T. Avar, Amherst, Is New President

The annual meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade came to a conclusion yesterday morning with the adoption of final resolutions, and the appointment of officers for the coming year.

Resolutions having to do with the transportation commission, transfer of car ferry accounting system, prospecting areas of mine lands for students, possible centralizing in Upper Canada of Atlantic Region, C. N. R. departments, and economy in governmental work.

The meeting adopted the report of the nominating committee, which brought in the following slate of officers:

President—N. T. Avar, Amherst. Vice Presidents:—For Prince Edward Island, R. L. Cotton, Charlottetown; For Nova Scotia, R. J. R. Nelson, Halifax; For New Brunswick, A. L. Foster, Saint John.

Executive Committee—G. E. Barbour, Chairman, Saint John; Seymour E. Baker, Yarmouth; R. P. Dickson, Moncton; B. W. Robinson, Summerside; H. A. Rice, Canso. Secretary—F. McL. Scanders.

**Resolutions**

A resolution having to do with the Transportation Commission was brought in as amended, and unanimously adopted. The resolution was to the effect that the Maritime Board of Trade approach the three Maritime Governments requesting them to resume the support of the Transportation Commission of the said Board as soon as possible in order that the commission may resume work on behalf of trade and commerce in the Maritime Provinces, and that each government be requested to appoint a representative on the commission in order that it might keep in touch with the work of the organization.

The resolution was moved by Mr. F. M. Scanders and seconded by Mr. D. R. Turnbull.

Resolution Number 4 dealt with the subsidies accruing to the Maritime in connection with the Western land sales, urging the Governments to have their cases fully prepared, so that when the opportune time came the interests of the Maritime Provinces would be protected.

It was stated that the Governments of Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia were in a position to file their claims and consequently the resolution was not passed.

A resolution dealing with the cost of the ferry service of the Canadian National Railways between Burden and Tormentine, asking that accounting be divorced from the railways and charged to consolidated revenue account, was moved by A. L. Foster, of St. John, seconded by Dr. J. A. Clark, of Charlottetown and passed.

Resolution Number 5 dealt with the mineral resources of the Maritime Provinces, and asking the setting aside of a comparatively small appropriation required to enable the systematic and consistent prospecting of likely sections in the respective provinces by university students of mineralogy under the guidance and direction of the provincial geologists. The resolution was moved by Mr. A. L. Foster and seconded by Mr. R. J. R. Nelson, Halifax.

A resolution was submitted sponsored by Moncton Board of Trade protesting against the centralizing in Upper Canada of various departments of the Atlantic Region of the Canadian National Railway and strongly opposing any change in the present administration. The resolution was moved by A. L. Foster and seconded by Mr. Doyle, Truro.

Resolution Number 9 was entitled "Economy," and sponsored by St. John Board of Trade. It reiterated a resolution passed at this recent annual meeting of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce which reaffirmed previous declar-

## KEROSENE KEEPS YOUR BICYCLE WHEELS FROM WARPING

Warping of wooden rims on bicycle wheels can be prevented by the use of kerosene. Pour a little around the base of each spoke about once a month, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. After several treatments, the rim becomes saturated so that moisture cannot penetrate the wood. The glue on the tire prevents the kerosene from affecting the rubber.
