PUBLIC OPINION By Bookman

Sir Thomas Brown, noted philosopher of the seventeenth century, said that "geography had a great deal to do with orthodoxy." This striking saying affirms a truth, namely that physical environment has much to do with our life—even our intellectual and moral life. We have often heard the matter discussed whether environment or heredity had more to do with our character. There is a sense in which we live in a certain environment and possibly were born there; in that case our birth place was in a sense inherited for we were not consulted about it.

Robert Louis Stevenson said that if we had been born in India, we might have been Hindus in religion. That might very well have been.

The physical aspects of a place have powerful influence on those who live there—it is by the sea we live in a certain environment and possibly were born there; in that case our birth place was in a sense inherited for we were not consulted about it.

Black Market Operators Active

HALIFAX, Aug. 1 (CP)—Sgt. Zimek, President of the Nova Scotia Retail Lumber Dealers' Association, said today tonight that black market operators in lumber were known to be active in this province to some extent.

Mr. Zimek said that at a recent meeting in Glace Bay, N.S., of the Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island Lumber Dealers' Association, members had gone on record as urging stoppage of non-essential construction and speedy action against black market operators.

He said lumber dealers in this province claimed that unless price changes were introduced to close the gap between the price of exported lumber and stocks sold for home use, adequate domestic supplies could not be expected for some time.

TEMPERATURES AFFECT MINERS' EFFICIENCY LONDON, Aug. 2 (CP)—Observations on miners working at the coalface in Great Britain showed that men employed in seams where the temperature was 81 degrees Fahrenheit had a working efficiency 41 per cent less than those in a temperature of 66 degrees.

Other experiments showed that excessive heat lowers efficiency. Men assembling the links of a bicycle chain in a temperature of 50 degrees took 12.24 min. to make 50 degrees took 12.24 per cent longer than in a temperature of 62 degrees.
