## Guldahl Wins Miami Golf Tournament

CORAL GABLES, Florida, Dec. 7.—(AP)—Rugged Ralph Guldahl of St. Louis, walked off with the \$2,500 top cheque in the Miami Biltmore's seventh annual golf open today.

Horton Smith collected the \$1,500 second prize with 285. He had led the field the first two days but cracked up Sunday.  
The veteran Gene Sargent of New York and Harold "Jug" McSpoden of Worcester, Mass., tied for stroke back of Smith and split third and fourth money totaling \$1,500.  
Guldahl shot 74 today and the other two more strokes on a protest by W. Lawson Little and Denny Shute, that he parted the grass over his ball in a hazard.  
R. T. Gray, of Windsor, Ont., only Canadian who qualified for the final day's play, was out of the money with 304. He scored 79 to-day.

## Graham-Lavigne Prominent In Victory

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) SUDBURY, Dec. 7.—Frood Mines, backed by the all-Halifax rear-guard of Frank Graham and Frank Lavigne, continued its march toward the Nickel Belt Hockey League title tonight with a 5-3 win over Copper Cliff.

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Dec. 7.—Slim Bill Cowley, the smiling centre who stepped up to the big time from the Halifax Wolverines, took over the scoring leadership among former Maritimers in the National Hockey League during the last week.

The six-point total he has picked up with Boston Bruins sent Cowley one up on Eddie Wiseman, New Brunswick-born New York American, who had led the Maritimers to date. Meanwhile today's N. H. L. statistics showed, Ray Getliffe of the Bruins brought his point total to five and drew even with Wiseman, who went scoreless during the week.

Cowley's points were split evenly between goals and assists, three each. Wiseman had three goals and two assists, while Getliffe's tally stood at two goals and three assists.  
Just three points behind the leaders—Nell Colville of Rangers and Aurie of Detroit—Cowley was in a tie with Pratt of Rangers for sixth place in the league's American section. Pratt also has three and three.

Cowley, always one of the League's cleanest players, is one of the few leaders who have yet to see the penalty-box gate swing behind them. He has not been sent to the mourners' bench yet.

## Schriner Closely Pressed For League Scoring Lead

MONTREAL, Dec. 7.—(CP)—Six Montreal Hockey League marksmen crowded Dave "Sweeney" Schriner of New York Americans for league scoring honors in official statistics issued tonight.

Schriner, in spite of having failed to fatten his total during the past week, remained in the top spot with 11 points but the others were close behind.  
Nick Metz, of Toronto Maple Leafs, with five goals and five assists, was only a point away, although he, like Schriner, went pointless during the week.  
Trailing Metz, with nine points,

were Johnny Gagnon of Canadiens, Bob Gracie of Maroons, Nell Colville of New York Rangers, Larry Aurie of Detroit and Art Chapman of Americans. Gagnon, Colville and Aurie were new additions to this group.  
Schriner, with seven goals, remained the leading goal-getter while Chapman's nine assists bested anything posted by other marksmen.  
Allan Shields, American's defence man, showed the longest penalty-box record, 23 minutes beating out Toronto's "Red" Hornor by three minutes.

## Dean Trade Still Pending Is Belief

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—(AP)—Branch Rickey's rode through the baseball market place today predicting that "the club that buys Dizzy Dean will win the National League pennant next year," but after a day of endless haggling there were no takers.  
Cornered between sessions with other club officials, Rickey said only three clubs in the League have enough players to deal for Dean. Presumably he meant the Giants, Cubs and Pirates.  
Rickey said Dean had been offered to the Giants but had been turned down. Phillip K. Wrigley, president of the Cubs, told the Associated Press "I don't want Dean on my ball team" and Warren Giles, general manager of Cincinnati Reds, who offered \$200,000 in cash for Dizzy, admitted today he was sure "Dean is going somewhere else."  
Nevertheless, what facts there are at a meeting like this indicated that Dean will be traded. Rickey said as much.  
"A week ago I thought we would trade Dean and I still think so," the Cardinal official said. "If we do it will be within the next 48 hours."  
Rickey, meeting Sam Breadon, president of the Cards, for the first time in 10 days, reported to his boss in front of the reporters:  
"I offered Dean to the Giants. I made them an offer which in my opinion didn't take a single key player from their team, and they wouldn't make the deal."  
Wrigley, the Cubs president, made the most surprising admission of the day.  
"If I can find a man at the meetings here this week capable of taking my job as president of the Cubs, I will appoint him," he said.

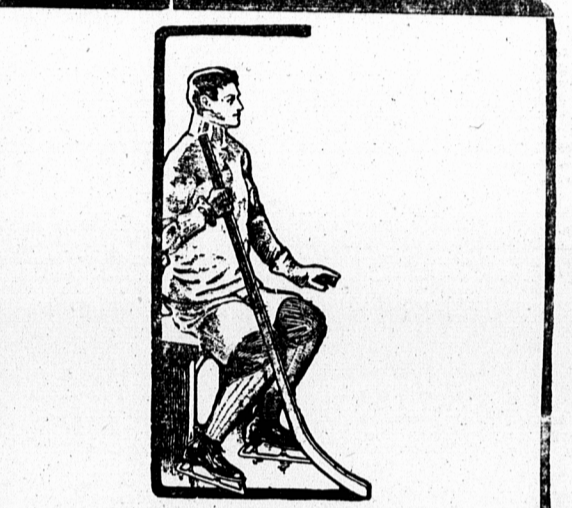
