THE COAL STRIKE HAS NOW ENDED

Men Will Return to Work After Six Weeks Idleness, Production Falling Off Five Million Tons--All Who Refrained From Violence to Be Re-Employed.

NEW YORK, May 7--(Special)--A committee representing the anthracite miners and operators of Eastern Pennsylvania today agreed to continue onward under the Strike Commission for another three years and the men will return to work as soon as practicable, probably Monday.

be reemployed and nobody will be discriminated against because of any active he may have taken in the strike movement. The agreement is subject to ratification by the miners' convention, but there is not the slightest doubt it will be approved. By Monday the miners will have been idle six weeks and the loss in production amounts to five million tons.

THE NEW I. C. R. RAILWAY SHOPS

(Special correspondence to The Guardian.) MONROVIA, May 5.--The new Intercolonial Railway shops, including machine shop, paint shop and locomotive building shops, round house, and all the equipments connected with the I. C. R. headquarters will be erected at the western end of the City, at the head of St. George Street, near High. The site selected by the Hon. Minister of Railways is considered to be the most convenient and appropriate in the city and will be very desirable to a large number of I. C. R. employees who reside in the west end of the city. Work will commence at once and it is said that Mr. Emmerson and his Deputy Minister, Mr. Butler, will spend some time on the spot in the very near future. The land property purchased by the Railway includes land owned by James Dikie, James Weldon, Ernest McDougall, Nelson McDougall, Alex. McDougall, and Peter McKenna. James Friel, barrister of Dorchester, has just returned from Ottawa, and will make the arrangements, and hand the cheques to the parties above mentioned. It now looks as though Moncton, during the coming summer, will be one of the busiest spots in the Maritime Provinces. Mr. Friel is the authorized agent of the I. C. R. and it was through him that the land purchases were made. It is stated that the clearing of the land, and the laying of temporary tracks etc., will soon commence. The citizens of Moncton are enthusiastic over the rebuilding of the I. C. R. shops.

FOUR DROWNED BY UPSET BOAT

QUEBEC, May 7--(Special)--Four men were drowned in Montmorency River today at a locality known to tourists as the Natural Steps. In so doing he upset the boat, throwing the other four men into the water and all drowned. They were married men of middle age.

THE MINISTERS WHO PRACTICE

Law in the Courts Criticised, Mr. Aylesworth Among the Number--Grand Trunk Telegraph Company Bill Held Over For Further Consideration in Commons.

OTTAWA, May 7--(Special)--In the House of Commons today R. L. Borden objected to the Bill incorporating the G. T. T. Telegraph Company, on the grounds that it proposed to do something the original Company had been incorporated to do. Sir Wilfrid Laurier said the principal underlying these branch companies was under consideration by the Government and he insisted the Bill be held. This was done.

PASSING OF THE "COASTER"

ST. JOHN'S, May 5--Of special interest to St. John's, where so large a business is done by the coastwise sailing vessels, is a despatch quoting Atlantic shipping men in touch with the coastwise trade as of the opinion that the day of sailing craft for this business is fast passing and that barges in tow and steam vessels will take their place. A Telegraph reporter yesterday asked of Willard Smith, who is one of the foremost shipping men in St. John in the coastwise trade, his opinion on the matter. "I believe the view is a correct one," said Mr. Smith, "in fact I prophesied a few years ago that this would take place. Of course I think that before this comes about there will have to be a combination of the lumber dealers as they will want to own their barges. They will probably want to use them for storehouses as well," remarked Mr. Smith. "A thing that the shipping men are somewhat tired of," he added, "has reference to the delay in obtaining delivery of cargo. The time," said he "is now nearly all carried by steamships. The smaller schooners that have been lost of late are not being replaced and the sailing vessels building are of the largest type and these principally for coal carrying and they might just as well be of steam. It has generally been found that the carrying by barges in tow is much cheaper."

LONGSHOREMEN IN SAINT JOHN

Are on Strike, Objecting to Employment of Members of Ship Laborer's Society--Shippers Claim They Can Get All Labor They Want, Which Strikers Deny.

ST. JOHN'S, May 7--(Special)--This city has another Longshoremen's strike, though no serious results are expected except to the laborers themselves as but a few vessels are now in port. During last winter's strike a split occurred in the Longshore Association and a new body called the Ship Laborer's Society was formed. These were employed on the Allan boats exclusively. Now that the Allan Liners go to Quebec the Thomsons, who are the Allan's agents, have employed them on Furness boats for which they are also agents. The members of the old union refuse to work with them and as Thompson will not discharge them have struck. This afternoon the strikers assembled on the wharf where a steamer was loading and made a disturbance, throwing deals down on the decks and painfully injuring one worker. The strikers declare there are not enough outside their ranks to do the work required, while shipping men say they can get all the laborers they want.

AUSTRALIA WANTS NAVY OF HER OWN

SYDNEY, May 7--According to advice received here from Captain W. R. Crosswell, Director of Naval Forces, the long-discussed project of a local navy for the Australian Commonwealth is about to materialize. Captain Crosswell has made the rounds of the important naval building yards on the Tyne and Clyde, and has now forwarded specifications and estimates for the construction of four destroyers and four torpedo boats to Senator Thomas Playford, with whom rests the responsibility of definitely placing the orders. It is not suggested that this force should in any way be a substitute for the British Australian squadron. It will be merely supplementary to it.

WOLVES KILLING BUFFALO HERDS

OTTAWA, May 7--The establishment of a population in the west is indicated by the return of homestead entries. During April 693 homestead rights were granted. This is almost double the number in the same month last year. The closed season for buffalo in the unorganized territories has been extended to 1912. The present prohibition would expire in 1907, having been enacted in 1902 for a term of five years. The only permission to take buffalo is for breeding purposes. There is a small herd of wood buffalo along the Mackenzie River, which is barely holding its own against the wolves. It is possible the mounted police may be instructed to make a campaign against the wolves so the buffalo may increase. Minard's Liniment Cures Dandruff.
