THE FASHION OF FUR

Do You Know The Origin Of Fur? Most women buy fur as they buy cotton or rayon, without a thought of its origin.

FUR IS DIFFERENT

Fur-bearing animals are taken in steel-traps. The steel trap is wasteful. It is indiscriminate. Its action breaks the leg of its victim.

DOES "FUR" ALWAYS DIE THUS?

In most cases, YES! Often an animal will gnaw off the protruding ends of its claws.

DO TRAPPING LAWS PROMOTE CONSERVATION?

The trapper is seldom hampered by conservation regulations. He may trap as many animals as he wishes.

DOES THE CRUELTY OF TRAPPING ENDANGER CONSERVATION?

A very few states, perhaps seven, require a license for the use of traps and removal of the catch but few trappers observe this regulation.

PELTS ARE AFFECTED BY SLOW DEATH

To the extent of being lost to trapper and commerce by the effects of gangrene, gnawing and twisting, this is a serious infringement on conservation of wild life.

IS THE STEEL TRAP WASTEFUL?

The steel trap confounds all hope of conserving wild life by its indiscriminate character. Song and game birds, useful hawks and owls, deer, moose, ground squirrels, chipmunks, projected species fall unintentional victims to the cruel jaws of the steel trap.

WHAT'S TO BE DONE?

A law can be passed in every state to abolish the steel trap in favor of humane traps in which animals do not suffer and those undisturbed, innocent or protected may be removed without injury.

ARE THERE SUCH HUMANE TRAPS?

There are several. One of them is the invention of Dr. Vernon Bailey, retired chief naturalist of the U. S. Biological Survey. It is being manufactured by the foremost trap company, The Animal Trap Company, Ltd., of Pennsylvania.

Supplementary Estimates Are Tabled In House

OTTAWA, March 25. (CP) - Finance Minister Mackenzie King tonight tabled in the House of Commons supplementary estimates for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1943, for \$2,664,361, bringing to \$66,000,000 the total non-war expenditures for the year.

Another large item was one of \$694,861 for the annual payment of the differential involved in administration of the Maritime freight rates Act for the year 1942.

For the increased cost of income tax collection the estimates call for an additional \$365,804 to cover administration of a National Revenue Department, and district offices, a total for the year of \$4,843,729.

A further amount of \$160,000 is provided for assistance to encourage the improvement of cheese and dairy products under the Agriculture Department. The original vote was \$1,850,000.

For postoffice administration, the estimates call for an additional \$100,000 is provided, and an additional \$75,000 for the National Film Board.

Public Works items included \$85,000 for Highway River improvements in British Columbia and \$12,000 for alterations and fittings for the testing laboratories in the West Block in Ottawa.

An additional \$98,300 is provided for the Royal Canadian Mounted Police for general administration and maintenance of the force under Federal statutes.
