SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

JANUARY 8.

JEHOBOAM MAKES IDOLS FOR ISRAEL TO WORSHIP.

1 Kings 12: 25-33.

GOLDEN TEXT.

"Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image."—Exodus 20: 4.

POINTED SUGGESTIONS

Jeroboam must be reckoned as being a shrewd, discerning and capable man. So much so that he might well be the envy of the mere politician. He foresaw the possible drift of things and what, from his standpoint, must be prevented. He knew how to accomplish what he thought was necessary.

But Jeroboam obtained by his political cleverness an inglorious fame. He was utterly wrong in the sight of God, and his statesmanlike capacity failed to put him in the front rank of offenders. It is recorded twenty-three times that Jeroboam made Israel to sin.

And he made Israel to sin through a persuasion of the spirit-given instinct within men to worship. Man is incurably religious. However much some may seek to argue that statement out of court it remains notwithstanding in court. At bottom, there is no deeper, keener, intenser, truer instinct in man than the religious instinct.

It was to this instinct that Jeroboam, for the purpose of the establishment of his throne and the commercial prosperity of his kingdom, made his appeal and fixed things. Calves of gold, priests, altars and their localities, festivals—all were for political reasons. He devised them of his own head.

But if man is a religious being, and if the Israelite had learned to worship, and if Jeroboam provided a way by which to satisfy the people in that regard, where was the worship, and if Jeroboam provided a first commandment broken? Scarcely so, since Jeroboam said and it could apply to none but Jeroboam: "Behold thy gods, O Israel which brought thee up out of the land of Egypt." He ventured, however, to symbolize Jehovah with calves of gold.

What about the second commandment, then? It is the breaking of this commandment whereby Jeroboam, the son of Nebat, sinned and made Israel to sin Jeroboam wanted only degraded the thought and the teaching of the spirituality of God.

Following the history of Israel, it is found that the breaking of the second commandment is likely to be followed by breaking the first. It is followed by Ahab thought it a light thing for him to walk in the sins of Jeroboam. Accordingly, he went and served Baal and worshipped him. And he reared up an altar for Baal in the house of Baal, which he had built in Samaria.

The warning of the lesson is against making a god of anything else or less than God, or permitting Him to be usurped in the smallest degree by the presence of any symbol through which it is thought to worship Him. The prayer of Thomas a Kempis is suggestive: "Grant us O our God, to rest in Thee above all that thou art not."

The whole question of idolatry and of what may constitute an idol or what may beget or foster false worship is a legitimate study when considering the sin of Jeroboam. In these days the danger may not lie among Protestants in the direction of image worship, but if an idol is "a person or thing on which the affections are strongly set," if it is "that to which we give our best," then the list of idols among Protestants may be a long one. Name some of them.

HERO OF SIEGE OF LUCKNOW CELEBRATES 84TH BIRTHDAY.

One of the incidents of individual bravery which have made Britishers great is recalled. The last surviving member of the gallant band of Lucknow V. Co., Sir Anthony Dixon Home, celebrated his eighty-fourth birthday the other Wednesday in New York.

With ten comrades, all of whom are dead, Sir Anthony, in September, 1857, held a house in a Lucknow bazaar against 1,000 Sepoys for a day and night in defence of wounded men. The little band had been cut off after the march of Havelock's relief column into Lucknow Residency, and was with the rearguard that attached to the 90th Light Infantry, and was with the rearguard that could not force its way through to the Residency with the main body of Havelock's men on Sept. 25.

The events of Sept. 25, which gained him the Victoria Cross, are still fresh in the memory of Sir Anthony. "With a guard of 150 men," he told the Daily Mail, "I was sent forward to convey the wounded into the Routed into the Residency. Sepoys were all around us on the house tops firing down, and when we reached a raised bazaar the native bearers of the palanquins, in which the wounded were borne, dropped their burdens and fled."

"With four men to help me I dragged some of the wounded into a one storey house. There were only ten effective men in the house, and outside a calculated 1,000 Sepoys. They massacred the wounded men, shooting and cutting them to pieces. We made a pile of dead to obstruct Sepoys who tried to rush the house, and kept up a steady fire."

"During the night there were only seven of us left fit to fight. The terror of the night were awful, for others of our wounded and fallen into the Sepoy's hands, and they burnt them to death within our sight. When daylight came we had given over hope. All at once, however, we heard the crack of Enfield rifles."

"Sure enough, it was a relief force out from the Residency, and we cheered like mad all together. We had looked death in the face for a day and a night."

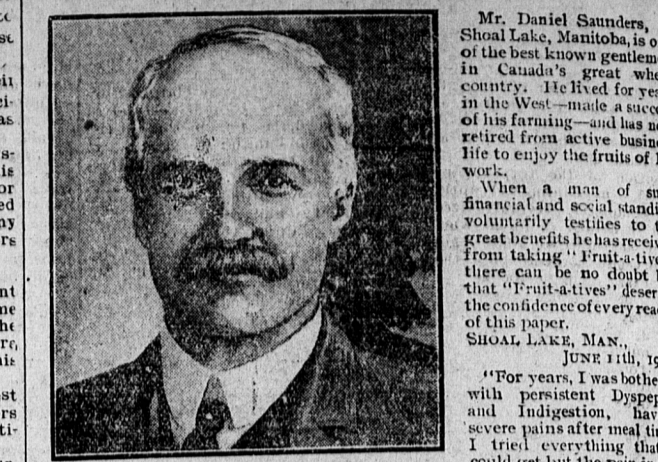
Rule 1 states that any householder in whose house occurs a case of measles shall immediately notify the Board of Health, through its Health Officer or Secretary, of the same.

There is a penalty of \$40.00 for failure to obey the rules.
The Board of Health requests all citizens to comply with the regulations at once, and assist in stamping out the disease.
