**WHAT THE PRESS RECEIVED FOR ADVERTISING THE VICTORY LOAN**

Various estimates have been made as to the amount the press received from the Government in connection with the press publicity for the Victory Loan, but the actual figures paid were clearly set forth in audited statements submitted to the Annual Meeting of Canadian Press Association, Inc., held in Toronto on June 13th and 14th.

The total amount paid by the Government for advertising space was \$165,419.81, which was distributed among 1400 newspapers and other publications. Approximately \$5,000 was spent in the preparation and distribution to the press of a large number of special articles, illustrations, cartoons, etc., which were inserted in the press without charge. The setting of type and making of duplicate plates of the advertisements for the various publications used and the fees paid to the five co-operating advertising agencies for their services in connection with the loan, amounted to the neighborhood of \$37,000, making the total expenditure \$208,166.09.

As the total cost of floating the Loan was approximately \$5,000,000 the Government's expenditure on press publicity represents less than five per cent. of the total expenditure. It is interesting to note also that the press publicity cost only one-twentieth of one per cent. of the total amount subscribed to the Loan.

The press publicity for the Loan was handled by Canadian Press Association, Inc., and the officers of the Association and its individual members co-operated splendidly in making the campaign a success. During the three months last, Fall most of the time of the President, Mr. J. H. Woods, Calgary "Herald," and the office staff, was devoted to the press publicity campaign, and for several weeks the committee of publishers in charge were in almost continuous session. The individual members, on the other hand, contributed, without charge, space in their newspapers and other publications which, if calculated at their regular commercial rates, would run up to more than the total amount paid for the advertising space.

Neither Canadian Press Association, Inc., as such, nor any of its officers or committees, received any remuneration for their services in connection with the Loan, those services being given voluntarily and in the spirit of national service.

**GERMANS BOMB ETAPLES HOSPITAL**

The following letters from Bomb. Hector T. Currie, has been received by his father, Mr. Nelson Currie, of Rocky Point.

2nd Western Gen. Hospital, Clyne House, Stratford, Manchester, Eng. June 4th, 1918.

Dear Father,—Just a line to let you know that I am getting on well. Am not at all a serious case, and made Blighty more by good luck than anything else. There are few other Blighty chaps besides myself here. Practically all our section were gassed, and nearly all of them came across. I am one of the lightest cases. My eyes are much better, and, and I didn't get much of the devilish stuff in the lungs. Was up town for a walk this afternoon.

Will be here for a few weeks at any rate, and it will likely mean a stay of three months anyway in England. Suppose a wire came to you telling that I had been gassed. Hope you will not get this letter. I happened to be rather short of money when I left France or I would have sent a telegram. Was in No. 7 Canadian Gen. Hospital at Etaples, France. We had quite a lively time while there. The Hun's bombed the hospitals and gave us a hell of a time. It is terrible the atrocities he does commit.

Well father, this is all the paper I have on hand, so will not write any more this time. Will write again tomorrow or next day. Hope that this finds everybody well. Address at top of letter for present. Love to all.

Dear Father,—My letter a few days ago was rather short, so I am going to attempt a longer one this morning. To begin with, I am coming on fine. This morning I feel as well as good as ever, which, if calculated at the rate, is a lovely morning. We have to be in bed at 9 every night, and up at 6 in the mornings. They feed us well here, of course. The other chaps from the 8th here with me, two of them are P. E. Islanders. Mollison of Summerside and Stewart Ross, the tailor's son, Charlottetown. Practically the whole section were gassed and as far as I can learn nearly all have gone to Blighty. The Hun's bombarded us heavily with gas for two nights. Some got it during the night. He gave the place such a drenching that it hung around the dugouts and a good number got a good deal of it, while working around in the daytime. Some left on the 27th, and a bunch on the 28th, and the rest of us on the 29th. I was on duty on the guns the day before I came away, and it is a day I'll not soon forget. I was weeling pretty sick, and all the crew likewise. And that day above all days we had a lot of shooting to do. The Hun's were dressing station, and by evening I had only three or four men left. My eyes were very bad next morning so I started off. We went as far as Casualty Clearing Station first day, and the next day were by train to Etaples. There is a large number of case hospitals here. I was in the 7th Can. General there. Were detained there for a few days and finally got away on the 3rd of June for England. The Hun's bombed the hospitals at Etaples while I was there. There was a large number of casualties including several nurses, and also patients. We sailed from Calais and landed at Dover. Had a very nice trip to Manchester. The country looks fine just now, and it is certainly good to be away from the war zone. I don't expect to be in hospital for a long time. Will then go to a convalescent camp, likely to Epsom. After that we will be sent to the artillery depot and get our leave. It will likely be three months or more before I'll be going back to France again.

I suppose the mail will be pretty badly mixed up for a while. You can send to this address for a while and I will have them forward it to wherever I go. I wonder if Wilmot has gone to France yet. If he hasn't I will likely see him at the base. Well, I think I have written enough for this time. Have lots of time for writing, now, so will drop a line quite often. Hope that this finds everybody well. Will close now with love to all.

**Unusual Number of Amputation Cases Among Returning Veterans**

Promptly on time the train bearing more than two hundred veterans arrived at 12:45 p.m. at the North Toronto C. P. R. station. Hundreds of friends and relatives crowded the station and lined the streets to welcome the veterans back to their homes. The sad feature of the home coming was the large number of amputation and cot cases, included in the party. Fully a hundred of the men had lost an arm or leg while fighting for their country against the Hun.

Although Toronto is growing quite accustomed to the return of these veterans, who are coming back in hundreds and thousands, there is no diminishing the intensity of the welcome extended on each successive occasion. The soldiers were received with open arms and the spirit displayed by the men was wonderful. Although in some cases so badly wounded that they could not move from their cots, their faces were wreathed in smiles and showed the pleasure which they felt at the many kindnesses extended to them.

**RHUBARB WINE**

Rhubarb wine is a good thing to make because rhubarb grows so profusely that most gardeners have a difficulty in using it up. Take 25 pounds of rhubarb, wipe the stalks, lay them on a clean board, and bruise them with a flatiron. Put them in a tub, add five gallons of water, and let it stand for nine days, stirring occasionally. Strain the liquor thus obtained and to each gallon add three pounds of sugar and the juice and half the rind of a lemon. Put it in a cask with two ounces of isinglass and let it stand for a month to ferment. A little current of damson juice improves the color of rhubarb wine.

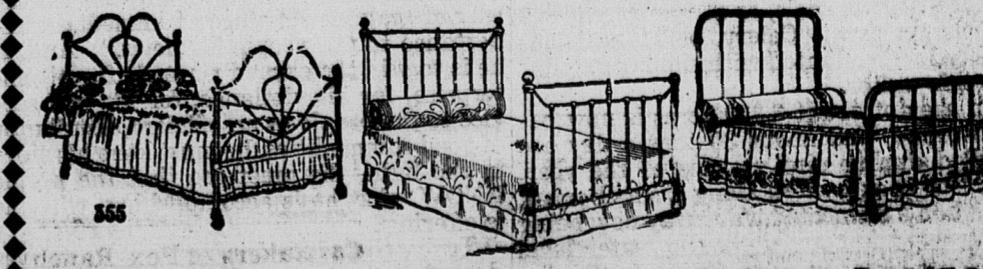
