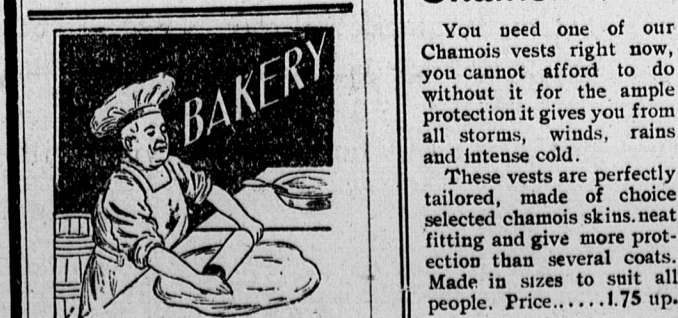

The Charlottetown Board of Trade recently directed the attention of the Department of Railways at Ottawa to the fact that information regarding the movements of the Winter Steamers cannot be obtained by passengers on Intercolonial Railway trains. In reply to the recent representations of the Board, L. B. Miller, Secretary of the Board of Trade, has a letter from the Department, signed by A. W. Campbell, as follows:—I am in receipt of your letter, dated the 9th instant, and in reply would say that we have arranged today with the Department of Marine & Fisheries to furnish Superintendent Sharp daily information as to the conditions of the crossing between the Mainland and Prince Edward Island. I have also written Mr. Pottinger asking that Mr. Sharp forward the information to Moncton when it will be daily bulletined at the principal stations along the line of the Intercolonial as per your request.

The third meeting of the Quarterly Official Board of the Pownal Methodist Churches was held on Feb. 14th at the home of Mrs. Henry Lane, Mt. Mellick. The pastor, Rev. E. E. Styles, occupied the chair, and Giles H. Jenkins, Recording Steward, read the records. The financial condition of the circuit was considered to be in advance of the corresponding term of the previous year, although, as four stewards did not report, it was impossible to make an accurate comparison. The members of the board were optimistic regarding the final accounts to be presented in May. Rev. E. E. Styles received an unani mous invitation to remain for the fourth year, very kind remarks being made concerning his work and his relations with the people. The Board very heartily and sympathetically endorsed Mr. Styles' application for three months' vacation. Ballots on the question of church union were issued to the members of the Board. It was decided that a congregational meeting shall be held at an early date at which reports from the various departments shall be presented and the working of the circuit explained. The final meeting of the Board will be held about the middle of May.
