PRINCE EDWARD HAS THRILLING SKY ROMANCE

With the warfare between Zeppelins and the London air defences during the World War as its basis, "The Sky Hawk," which opened yesterday at the Prince Edward Theatre, is one of the most thrilling productions on record. Much of its interest is due to its being the first all talking Movietone romance of the world. The intensely dramatic qualities of Llewellyn Hughes' sensational story published as "Chap Called Bardell," are thus strengthened.

Containing many spectacular scenes of London terrorized by the air raids, and with a gripping climax in which one of the giant airships is shot down in flames, "The Sky Hawk" ranks among the very few of its type and treats all the combatants impartially.

John Garrick, the youthful British actor aviator, acknowledged as the season's talking screen find, is splendidly cast in the title role, and Helen Chandler, the former Theatre Guild star, is a delightful heroine. Gilbert Emery plays the third featured role with even greater effect than in "Behind That Curtain." A notable supporting cast includes Billy Bevan, Joyce Compton, Lennox Pawle and other established screen celebrities.

SPORT SLUG

Evar Swanson of the Cincinnati Reds circled bases in 13 2-5 seconds during an exhibition contest one day last Summer, clipping at least a full time of a second from Hans Lobert's record that stood unequalled for nineteen years. Two of the official watches that day caught Swanson in 13 3-10, but the timing consensus registered 13 2-5 seconds. That is extraordinary speed, stamping Swanson indisputably as baseball's modern Mercury.

In hockey—fastest of all sports—Howie Morenz of Les Canadiens is generally acclaimed as the speediest of all its players. This wonderful wingman might not be able to equal

the time of champion skaters over straightaway or other race courses, but for sustained celerity on the ice throughout a game—shooting this way, and then that—Morenz can probably cover more space in less time, than any other ice-bird that ever swung a stick.

Among the regulation track speedsters, this year has brought George Simpson, of Ohio State, to international attention. He did the 100 yards in 9 2-5 seconds. Simpson certainly is a lineal successor to Charley Paddock, Percy Williams and other immortal sprinters.

None can now think of such examples of sport lightning without re-

calling the successful way in which Jack Elder, of Notre Dame, transferred his sprinting ability from the track to the football gridiron. He perhaps was the game's fastest back last Fall, crowning a brilliant season with a 98-yard touchdown sprint at New York City when Notre Dame beat the Army through that great run, 7-0.

Elder escaped injuries and he undoubtedly will try to set a new world's 100-yard record during 1930.

Swanson in baseball, Morenz at hockey, Simpson on the track and Elder at football—they justly may be classed as "Sportdom's Fastest Four" during 1929.
