DISCUSSION ON F. C. A. ACT IN SENATE
 (Continued)

Hon. Mr. MacDonnell (continuing): Honourable senators, I tried to conclude my remarks before 6 o'clock, but did not quite succeed. There is just about one sentence that I should like to add to explain why I feel rather strongly about the statement placed before this House—a statement for which the man in charge of the Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Act is responsible. Just one inference can be taken from that statement, namely, that a great body of the population in Prince Edward Island, consisting of business men, general merchants and farmers, are knaves and fools. I resent that statement very strongly, and that is my chief reason for speaking before this honourable body this evening.

Hon. J. E. Sinclair: Honourable members, during the earlier stages of this debate it was not my intention to take part; not that I agreed with all that was said. However, since there has been so much discussion in this House and in the committee of the way in which the Act has been administered in the province of Prince Edward Island, and since several honourable senators from other provinces have cited it as a reason why something should be done for it, my duty to describe what I believe to be the condition there regarding the administration of the Act by the official receivers under the supervision of the Director at Ottawa. I wish to give a true picture of conditions in Prince Edward Island, and to show honourable members of this House that the condition there is not such as has been painted by honourable members from other provinces who have addressed this House. I hear a good deal about what is going on, and have as good an opportunity as any other honourable member of this House to know what is happening. When I listen to attacks made upon the administration of the Act, and hear the statement that the Act is injuring the credit of the farmers, I feel it is only right that I should describe what I believe to be the true situation and conditions in respect to the need of continuing the Act.

I base my remarks on the amendments we are now considering, the clause which calls for the discontinuance of the Act at the end of the year. I think that any such action would be a mistake. It is fair and right that discretion should be left with the Governor in Council to say when the Act should be discontinued in any province in Canada. I think it would be unfair to the farmers of this country who find themselves in an insolvent condition, that the Act should be discontinued. Honourable members know that the Act as it now stands, and as it has stood since it was introduced in 1934, it is provided that no bills incurred by farmers suddenly found themselves obliged to match his speed and cunning against Prince, that sagacious dog owned by Mr. Golden Smith of St. John. This was the Prince's first experience at fox hunting nor did he act like a greenhorn at the game. In less than one-half hour the crafty fox found himself treading rarely at the familiar surroundings of his pen, while Prince late pursuer stood proudly panting and receiving the plaudits and fond caresses of his master. Mr. Smith deserves congratulations in the manner in which he has trained his famous police dog. Prince is now surely an asset to any community.

There is another point that I wish to make. Several honourable members stated in committee a day or so ago that a farmer whose assets were greater than his liabilities would be considered insolvent, that he had no right to come under the Act, and that the official receivers and board of receivers would not be his creditors. Well, I should like to quote from a statement made by the then Prime Minister when he introduced the Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Act. This is what he said on June 11, 1934, as reported at page 3850 of the House of Commons Hansard:

"What is proposed now is the adoption of the general principle of the Bankruptcy Act. A farmer who is unable to meet his liabilities at the time he makes a proposal for a composition, an extension of time or a scheme of arrangement, either before or after his insolvency, has some sort of security. Labor should be entitled to organize freely, as long as it did not paralyse the life of the nation."

This proposal is to take care of the farmer who is not in a position to meet his obligations. Instead of assigning or taking the benefits of the Bankruptcy Act, if the farmer is unable to pay his creditors, he suggests to his creditors that if he is given an extension of time he may be able to work out his liabilities.

So the interpretation of insolvency as applied to a farmer—and this is borne out by the Act itself—is that the farmer is not able to meet his liabilities when they become due. I think our official receivers and board of review in Prince Edward Island have interpreted the Act quite so liberally as that. That is to say, even though a farmer was not able to come under the Act, he was not being pressed to make payment or settlement he was not encouraged to come under the Act.

There is provided a Farm Loan Act, that is an amendment to the existing legislation which while it has not been accepted by all the provinces, is in force in many of them. We propose to make some necessary administrative amendments which our experience has taught should be made, and further to authorize the board of review, which larger sum than that provided for by the Act, the limit being \$7,500, and instead of fixing the amount of the mortgage at fifty per cent to provide for a lesser margin of safety and increase the amount of the mortgage to sixty per cent.

In addition to that it will be observed by many of those honourable members now listening to me that after we have done all these things it is quite obvious that the insolvent farmer might not then be in any position to go forward, because he would have no money with which to undertake his work. We therefore propose that the Farm Loan Board should be authorized, by way of what would amount to a second mortgage, to advance a limited sum, which is mentioned in the Act—and a mat-
