treasure of the island of Pinaki whose hiding place, after a patient search of over seven years, has at last been discovered. And now a schooner from Tamiti has been despatched to bring away the gold.

A half century ago, four sailors deserters from a coastwise vessel, joined revolutionists in Peru and looted a vast treasure of jewels, plate and ingots, the property of the church, which had been hidden in Peru to prevent it from falling into the hands of one of the warring factions. Secretly the sailors searched for the treasure found it concealed in a church building and moved it to another hiding place on the coast.

Going to Panama, the seafarers, at night, boarded a small schooner, murdered the crew, and, after putting the treasure aboard, set sail across the Pacific, intending to make some European port later to dispose of their wealth. Recalling that they had no clearance papers and probably could not enter a European port safely, they decided to hide the gold on some uninhabited island, and then get it later in a vessel they would harter at Sydney, N. S. W., for trading purposes.

ANTIQUEITY OF ASBESTOS

Asbestos has been known for many centuries. Many of the peoples of ancient times used it, and it was sometimes wrought into soft and flexible cloth, which was used as a shroud for the dead. There are many varieties and a large number of common and descriptive names have been applied to these varieties. Ligniform asbestos, popularly called "mountain wood," is a variety, presenting filamentous structure like wood. Other varieties are popularly called rock cork, mountain leather, fossil paper and fossil flax.

FEWER BACHELORS

The marriages of bachelors over 45, both in 1918 and 1919, were twice as numerous as in 1911. The increase of marriages in later years was, in fact, common to both sexes. Another striking fact revealed by the recent report of the Registrar-General is that the total loss of births due to the war may be more than 500,000 or very similar to the number of deaths on active service. A TREASURE TROVE IS FOUND ON ISLAND

Sailors Steal Millions in Peru and Carry Them Away to Pinaki

Bury Loot in Lagoon.

Romance is not yet dead. Tales of buccaneering murder on the high seas, buried gold on lonely uninhabited islands and charts and cryptograms of hidden treasure trove are not all inventions of imaginative minds or legends of a day which is long past.

Such a tale is the story of the

beggar and his surviving companion, Brown, tried for years to get a ship to go for the treasure, but never obtained money enough. Brown finally disappeared and he, Killrain, had fallen into misfortune and knew his end was near. Since then Howe has been searching for the treasure and lately announced that he had found it in a shallow lagoon on Pinaki. Lately he chartered a schooner at Papete to go to lit the gold, after making a contract with the Colonial Government as to his rights in the matter. It is said the treasure is worth several million dollars.
