FOR some time past the adoption of wireless telegraphy at Capes Tormentine and Traverse has been advocated and the action taken seems to be thoroughly in line with a similar movement made elsewhere in Canada and the United States. The Toronto World says: "Wireless telegraphy is no longer an experiment, but a practical business reality, that is, within a certain limited sphere. One of the first applications of the system on the continent will be in connection with the shipping of the great lakes. It has already been sufficiently perfected to enable vessels on the lakes to communicate with stations on land. The range of wireless telegraphy is ample enough to cover the great lakes, so that a vessel, no matter where it may find itself, will always be in touch with the shore. United States Government officials have been experimenting with wireless telegraphy for some time back, and they report that gratifying success has marked their efforts: Prof. Moore, the chief of the Weather Bureau, under which department the experiments were carried on, says he feels warranted in predicting that in the near future the commerce upon the lakes and the vessels engaged in coastwise trade will be constantly in touch with the shore to report accidents to machinery or summon succor in case of fire, as well as to receive warnings from the weather bureau of approaching storms. "We are not saying much about the experiments at this time," said Prof. Moore, "because we have determined to remain silent as long as there is any doubt whatever of the success of our system. I can say, however, that we have a new apparatus, all our own invention. We are branching out on new lines, and the results so far accomplished have been gratifying in the extreme. We hope to complete the experiments during the next two or three months, and believe we will revolutionize shipping upon our lakes and along our coasts by making it possible for the masters to maintain communication with the shore by our wireless system of telegraphy."

An interesting Case Before Judge Warburton, Dec. 11, 1900.

McDonald vs. McKenzie. This was an action brought by the plaintiff, the keeper of a livery stable, against the defendant for damages done a buggy while the same was hired by the defendant. The evidence showed that the injury was occasioned by horse and carriage driven by a drunken man, colliding with the buggy, whose owner exercised all reasonable and proper care. The defence rested on two grounds first that the defendant did not personally hire the buggy, and second that in any case he was a bailee, and as such was not liable for injury to the property entrusted to him, so long as he exercised reasonable and proper care.
