GRAND PATRIOTIC RALLY

Of all its male help, for a man on the farm would be of more value than he would be at the front. The last speaker had said that the time would come when conscription would become necessary. It had never been necessary in the British army and he hoped it would never be. But if such a thing should happen, that volunteer subscription failed to render the British Crown to full duty that this Island owes, then he would ask the Legislature to give the Government power to place at their disposal for the purposes of defences not only a proportion of the revenue, but the whole of the revenue of the province. (Cheers.)

Rev. Dr. T. F. Fullerton then gave a short and excellent address, strongly supporting the loyalty of Prince Edward Island. There was no other part of the Dominion that responded more admirably to the call than she, taking into consideration the size of provinces. He was sure the present fund would be liberally subscribed to, and he would suggest contributions be made to extend over four or five payments.

Rev. Dr. Simpson was the last speaker. He advocated strenuous and continuous drill for the young men of the province that they might become in a measure used to the hardships of war. He suggested that the local water supply sources might be guarded as affording very good practice. In conclusion, he appealed for the hearty support of the Patriotic Fund.

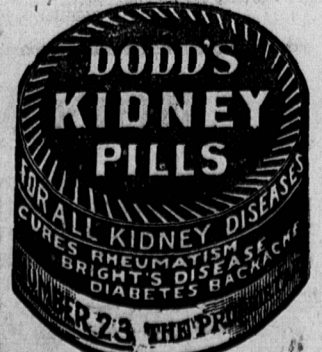
Lieutenant-Governor Rogers then read a message from the Governor-General of Canada, published some time ago in the Guardian, appealing for aid to the fund.

THE ART OF PAINTING "TONE" AS DEVELOPED BY EDISON.
