British Air Liner Largest in World

(Special to The Guardian).

LONDON, July 26.—A great flying boat, the largest air liner in the world, is under construction at the super-marine aviation works, Southampton, says the Daily Chronicle. It will be able to fly from an English port to New York in twenty-four hours, the paper says, and may carry thirty to forty passengers in addition to the crew.

The greatest secrecy is being observed in its construction and only three or four people are acquainted with the details. Workmen employed in the manufacture of the various parts are sworn to secrecy. Special attention has been given to the hull, which involves certain new principles and in appearance is like that of a large ship. The craft will be fitted with two engines, each of 650 horsepower.

Designs have been produced for both cargo and passenger carrying flying ships, and in each case the size is far in excess of that of any flying boat that has ever before been built. If descent at sea should be necessary, the ship will be able to land safely in the worst weather, it is said, and ride at anchor or proceed through the water under its own power.

If the normal freight were replaced by fuel the vessel would be able to stay at sea for a very long period and this will likely give it considerable value as a fighting craft. It will also be able to climb rapidly to considerable altitudes.

Mr. Scott Payne lifted the veil on the project when interviewed by the post's Southampton correspondent. "The idea of this ship was conceived at the suggestion of the Air Ministry about a year before months ago. We are now working on the plan at these works for the Air Ministry. We have made good progress with the hull and it is expected to be ready for launching by September. The completion of the flying boat, I expect will take about twelve months."

..WELCOME VISITOR.—Mr. Frank F. Tuplin, formerly of Summerside but now of Michigan, who is visiting the island at present, and whose magnificent car is attracting so much attention, recently contributed \$100 to the Prince County Soldiers' Monument Fund. Mr. Tuplin is one of the outstanding pioneers in the silver brick box farming industry and to Mr. Tuplin is the credit for pioneering the industry in the United States, the same as he pioneered and developed the industry that has made P. E. Island famous the world over.

..BRICK MAKING.—A new industry, for which there should be a good future, has just been started at Summerside. Mr. Wallace Gallant, of Bloomfield Station, acquired a property on Water St. West last spring and has just completed the erection there of a pretty and compact bungalow, to which he has now moved with his family. Mr. Gallant is an expert maker of pressed cement bricks and he is fitting up a manufacturing plant with a capacity of 2,000 bricks a day. He has had previous eight year's experience in the business, on the island and the mainland and, as an example of his skill, we may mention that Dr. D. R. Gallant's residence at Bloomfield was built entirely of pressed cement bricks made by him eight years ago. The walls are in just as good condition today as the day they were built, and it will cost him not cost a penny for paint or other maintenance—proving that in the long run this method of building is by far the cheapest. As a matter of fact, Mr. Gallant thinks, with freight rates now coming down, the day is not far distant when the initial cost will be quite as low as wood. As there is an unlimited supply of sand and gravel adjacent to Mr. Gallant's premises he should be able to manufacture and supply these bricks as cheaply as anywhere in Canada, either for entire buildings or for flue and foundation work.

IS NORTH ONTARIO END OF HIS RAINBOW?

MONTREAL, July 26.—After 20 years as a pilot on the Mersey, Captain J. A. Irelan Jones, a retired pilot of the Allan Line, has come with his wife to Canada to claim a fortune which he believes is awaiting him in the soil of northern Ontario. The property in question is in the neighborhood of Newmarket and consists of 350 acres. Irelan Jones believes it is richly laden with silver, nickel, and cobalt, and is waiting to be mined. He was in the past 25 years, that he accidentally learned that it is believed in the learned that it is a veritable storehouse of minerals. The old age of rich ore, who, having been in his office, in County Donegal, Ireland, for the past six years, Irelan Jones, who is now in Montreal, was called for Montreal on the Star-Dominion liner Canada, which arrived here from Liverpool last night. They brought with them several specimens of ore sent them 25 years ago by one John Orr, Mrs. Jones' brother, who died in the north country many years ago after selling his land to his sister and brother-in-law.

ORDER STANDS, SAYS C.N.R. HEAD

TORONTO, July 26.—D. B. Hanna, president of the C.N.R. board, which resigned in a body yesterday, was questioned today respecting the premier's opposition to the so-called "Hanna order."

"The order in question," said Mr. Hanna, "is an order forbidding any employe of the national railways from running for parliament or accepting a nomination. It is not directed against the wage earning employes in particular. It applies to all right down to the lowest officials." The two men who ran for the legislature in Manitoba, knew they were violating this order and automatically were forced out of the service.

The order was in accordance with our whole policy of leaving politics out of the business of the national railways.

"This effect will the premier's opposition have on the Hanna order?" he was asked.

"The order still stands," replied Mr. Hanna emphatically. "I received no word from the premier, and I am not going to give the order at present. The government has never interferred with the railways board and we have always had a free hand so far as the board is concerned."

"Can you give any idea of how long it will be before the new railway board is appointed?" he was asked.

"It will be very shortly. You know our resignations will not be forwarded to Ottawa until this afternoon or tonight but after that the government will act quickly. I think it will be before the end of the month."

Mr. Hanna said he was quite in the dark as to who would constitute the new board nor could he say whether Major Bell, deputy minister of railways, would be appointed.
