The result of the trial in Boston in which Mrs Elizabeth G. Richmond was charged with the murder of Stewart McTavish, of this Province, which is announced in another column was watched with a great deal of interest in P. E. I. Through papers sent The Guardian by a friend in Boston it is learned that the jury were out twenty-one hours and a verdict of guilty of murder in the second degree was finally reached.

The exchange says: Up to two o'clock this afternoon (May 28) the jury had been out twenty-one hours with no agreement. The jury went to breakfast at 7 o'clock this morning, returning to the jury room in the East Cambridge Court House an hour later. Time dragged slowly, with no signs from the jury room. At 9:45 Judge Dana called the jury out and urged it to reach a verdict. The jury retired to its room again. At 11 o'clock Judges Dana and Crosby left the Court House. Mrs. Richmond spent the night in the rear of the court room, where she might be called instantly. Once during the night she was taken into the court room when the jury came in from its deliberations for further instructions. Mrs Richmond showed the great strain under which she was laboring. The strain was also evident upon the jurors. When they had filed into the court room and had taken their seats Juror Murray leaned forward in his chair, bowed his head on the rail before him and appeared to weep. His body shook for some time as though he were sobbing. The instruction sought by the jury was in regard to what constituted a reasonable doubt. Foreman Fiske put the question to Judge Crosby. He said that opportunity for another person to commit the crime did not constitute reasonable doubt unless it resulted in creating a reasonable doubt in the jury's mind. The summons from the jury room caused considerable scurrying to reach the judges and Mrs. Richmond. In the great crowd gathered about the court houses it resulted in the rumor that the jury had reached a verdict. The people thronged into the court room. Mrs. Richmond was brought over from the court room accompanied by Sheriff Fairbairn. She waited patiently while the jury filed in. Her face was seen to pale slightly as Foreman Fiske stood up; then her look changed to one of disappointment as she realized that they had not agreed. The unusual spectacle of a woman fifty years old on trial for her life drew a large crowd to the court room. Most of the throng lingered late into the night in the hope that a verdict would be reached. At midnight there were still a few hundred about the court building. At that hour the court officers cleared the building, but many of the crowd hung about the streets outside after the court building had been locked.

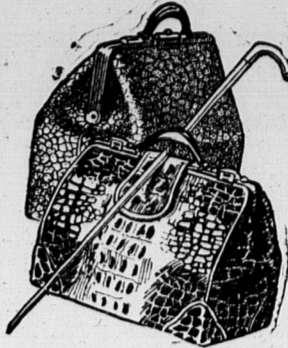

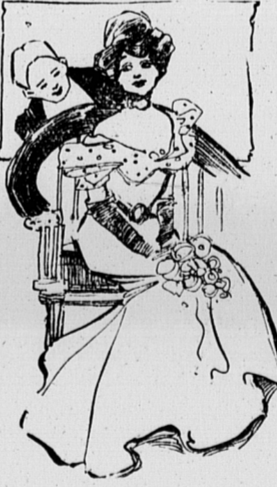
