While we are rejoiced to see you back with us again yet we deeply regret that it has not been your luck to come through scathless but we trust and know that an all wise providence has some object in view, which in due time be revealed and that you will be granted a full measure of strength, so that the old cry of the Canadian Corps will still ring out true and strong: "Are we down-hearted? No!" We also wish to sympathize with you in your bereavement in which a beloved elder brother made the supreme sacrifice; but we trust that Time which will cure the injuries of the body, will also heal the wounds of the heart. There are few fellowships more true or loyal than that of the battlefields of France and we earnestly hope and desire that we may be able to carry that fellowship into our civil life and as a very small evidence of that desire and of the honor and regard we have for yourself we would ask you to accept this small gift of a walking cane, hoping that not its intrinsic value, but the spirit in which it is given will be the gauge by which you will value it.

Following is the address: To Pte. Joseph E. Tierney.

Dear Sir:—It is a great pleasure for your friends to come here this evening to extend a warm and hearty welcome home to you, one of the youngest and bravest of our island's boys who fought for the honour and glory of our Empire's flag in France.

When you enlisted in the 105th Bn 1915 the greatest war this world has ever known was in full progress and the soil of Belgium and France was being dyed with the blood of the heroic defenders of the cause of civilization and humanity. And then, though you were scarcely sixteen years of age, you did not shrink from facing the fiery ordeal of the bloody battlefield, but animated by the spirit of patriotism one of the noble attributes of man you loyally answered your country's call and volunteered for service abroad.

Your bravery in enlisting at such an early age, calls forth our warmest admiration and praise which cannot be adequately expressed in words, neither can we find words in which to express our appreciation of your gallant conduct on many a battlefield. And so after many narrow escapes from death you have returned to your home and friends in whose defence you fought so bravely on the battlefields of France.

And here in years to come generations yet unborn will relate with pride and glory how at that period in the world's history when the freedom of Canada and the rest of the civilized world was attacked by the legions of hell, how nobly and bravely the boys of this community fought that our glorious Canadian soil should never be trodden under the foot of the brutal and murderous Hun. ADDRESS OF WELCOME AND PRESENTATION TO PTE. MARTIN MACDONALD

On Tuesday evening, April 15th, upwards of eighty people gathered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. M. A. MacDonald, Lyndale, to welcome their son Martin, after an absence of three years overseas. Pte. MacDonald enlisted with the famous 105th Battalion in Nov. 1915, crossed to England in June 1916. He later transferred to the 13th Canadian Battalion, and with them crossed to France. An address of welcome was read by Mr. Alexander Martin, and little Miss

Ella MacDonald on behalf of the Valleyfield Comfort Circle presented her brother with a gold signet ring. The guests then resorted to the dining room, where the table was laden with dainties temptingly appealing to do them justice. With Pte. MacDonald at the table were seated four returned soldiers, namely, Pte. Alex D. Martin, Grand View, Pte. John P. MacLeod, Alexander MacDonald and Roddy MacLeod, Valleyfield. The remainder of the evening was very pleasantly spent in games and music. The following is the address:

We gather here a happy crowd, To welcome you amongst us, To welcome and to honor you, Our purpose and our aim is.

When Britain's cry from o'er the sea First rang across the waters, You heeded well that urgent call From Britain to her daughters.

For three times three and thirty Months The khaki suit you wore And always strove to do your bit To help to win the war.
