and the best livestock in the Maritimes on display and a big midway has proved the biggest winner of anything brought out yet in the Maritimes.  
Hoof beats, official organ of the United States Trotting Association, sent a feature writer here in 1945 and reporting in that magazine he said I have seen all the great harness racing meets in the Old Home Week at Charlottetown on a Wednesday and Thursday afternoon. The enormous crowds, the excitement and the combination of vaudeville and racing enthused me and I shouted as lustily as others.  
Last year an added attraction was the night racing made possible by the installation of lighting that cost upwards of \$15,000 and makes the track practically as bright as day. It gave many horse owners an opportunity to earn money during the week prior to Old Home Week. Races were held on Saturday evenings under the lights and crowds of 3,000 people or more attended and enjoyed the beautiful spectacle so much that night racing is a feature to be up to date the latest tip of starting. Gate was best tip and the starts were so satisfactory that it was also used in the afternoon races Old Home Week and hired by other tracks in the Province and at various points in the Maritimes.  
The coming year Old Home Week and Monday Exhibition will open Friday evening, August 15th with a night racing program and the four succeeding days will have the full exhibition program with the finest livestock in the Maritimes on display in the mornings and racing and vaudeville.  
A full program of vaudeville will be on each evening with one or more harness horse racing events on at least two of them. Then there will be the usual large midway with a gaily decorated booth, many entertaining acts, spectacular rides and other features that appeal to those who are not so interested perhaps in the other parts of the program.  
Old Home Week has drawn National attention and such a great number of travellers as John Fisher was a pleased spectator this year. His description over the airways must have pleased many of our people in distant lands as it certainly pleased folks at home.  
The Montreal Standard devoted a colored section to it, very capably gotten up by staff photographers and feature writers.  
The management are announcing their dates now August 15th to 19th, 1949 so as to give those abroad and those at home who wish to infuse the funds abroad time to make their arrangements for holidays or absence from business. They have also set their Goodwill Race Meet as September 14th and 15th.

### Jenkins, MacPherson Battle To Draw

KENTVILLE, N.S., Nov. 28 — (CP) — For the second time within a month, Ralph (Black) Jenkins, 172, of Charlottetown and Donald (Red) MacPherson, 167-pounder from New Waterford, N.S., battled to a six-round draw in the feature bout of a boxing card here Saturday.  
The MacPherson-Jenkins affair had the fans on their feet most of the way, and was even better than the fight between the same pair here recently. Jenkins looked to have things well in hand when he put MacPherson down for counts of eight and nine in the fourth round. But the New Waterford fighter made a sensational comeback. He took the fifth round and in the sixth had Jenkins practically out on his feet when the gong sounded to end the fight.

### Former World Boxing Champ Dies At 48

KATONAH, N. Y., Nov. 27 — (AP)—Jack Delaney, the colorful French-Canadian who held the world light heavyweight boxing title during the golden '20s, died Saturday at his suburban home near here.  
Best remembered for his four sensational bouts with Paul Berlenbach, Delaney, a native of St. Francis, Que., was a glamorous figure in the gaudy period when big names and big purses brought the boxing game to its peak.  
One Berlenbach-Delaney bout opened the "new" Madison Square Garden in 1925. That was the night Delaney failed in his title quest, losing a 15-round decision. Less than a year later, in July, 1926, he wrested the crown from Berlenbach before a gate of \$461,789 at Ebbets Field. That still stands as a record for light heavyweights.  
Twice the 48-year-old fighter knocked out Berlenbach when no championship was at stake. The first bout lasted four rounds in the old Garden and their last meeting, Dec. 9, 1927, ended in the sixth.  
In 1927, Delaney, whose real name was Ovilva Chapdelaine, fought a 10-round bout with Jimmy Maloney at the Garden. The box office take was \$201,613, which was not topped at the Garden until the late Louis-Jersey Joe Walcott scrap last December.  
Four years after his retirement in 1928 he started a short-lived comeback and moved to Meredith, N. H. Later he returned to Bridgeport, Conn., and entered the used car business. He also managed a tavern.  
Last spring he underwent an operation in New York, where authorities declined to disclose the nature of his illness.
