As an instance of the destruction of innocent hawks under mere suspicion, there may be cited an item just published in the report of progress of an investigation of methods for increasing quail. Upwards of thirty marsh hawks were frequenting roosting places in the game cover, and about half of these were shot. Then over a thousand of the castings of the birds were examined, each representing a meal, with the result that the remaining of four quail were found, while more than nine hundred meals had included one or more cotton rats, which eat the eggs of the quail. Indeed the statement

is emphasized that most of the enemies of the quail are also the destroyers of its foes. This instance illustrates the complexity of a problem which many have the assurance to settle off-hand, even when their answer means the extermination of the species under suspicion.

There remain other phases of the subject which deserve more than mere mention. In a few of our states, from a mistaken devotion to the supposed interests of the sportsmen, virtually all hawks are classed as "vermin" (a term which should not be applied to any creature so highly organized as a hawk) and all legal protection is removed. In several other states, certain of the destructive hawks are the victims of bounty laws, while many of the species are entitled to the same protection that is accorded to other beneficial or harmless birds. But we have yet to hear of anyone being prosecuted for killing a protected hawk. On the contrary thousands of hawks supposed to be under protection are killed, and bounties are paid for their scalps.

Even our national bird, the white-headed or bald eagle, the sight of which, free and unafraid, should be a source of sacred pride and inspiration to all citizens, is frequently shot on the plea that it destroys wild ducks. As a matter of fact it is virtually impossible for such a bird to capture an injured duck, and practically all secured are cripples which have

escaped immediate death by gunshot, but which are slowly dying from their wounds, or from starvation and exposure. This habit should therefore be considered in the light of a virtue, rather than an undesirable trait.

Next to the eagle in size and grandeur of flight is the osprey or fish-hawk, a bird of very wide distribution. True, it lives exclusively on fish, and therefore would be banished from the earth by some short-sighted person, because of its occasional capture of

France Budgets For Increased Armaments

PARIS, Sept. 30—Finance Minister Georges Bonnet today presented a 1938 budget bill calling for a \$101,900,000 increase in expenditures for armament, but expediting a move for armament reduction. The bill's preamble carried a warning that "under pain of general financial catastrophe" Europe may be forced to seek an agreement on armament limitation. Thus, it was stated, France may be able to "slacken the effort which she accepts at present to assure her security."

CUTLERS' FEAST OPENS TO WOMEN

SHEFFIELD, England, Sept. 30—(CP)—Another cherished tradition will disappear when the Cutlers' feast, first held in 1677, takes place Nov. 1. For the first time in its long history, a woman guest will be present.

The Lord Mayor of Sheffield always attends the feast. This year the city's civic head is Mrs. A. E. Longden and she will attend.

The "no women" tradition was endangered back in 1928. The master cutler usually invites mayors of neighboring towns to the feast. That year Miss Violet Markham was mayor of Chesterfield. But Miss Markham was not invited to the feast—indeed, she was asked to a reception to the Cutlers' guests on the same night, she declined, declaring it would not be in keeping with the prestige of her town for her to accept any lesser position than that normally accorded a mayor of Chesterfield.

Sir John Simon, Chancellor of the Exchequer, will be guest of honor at this year's feast.

a trout or salmon. Yet the usual food of the bird consists almost entirely of common fish, and we can spare it a livelihood in exchange for the sight of its inspiring maneuvers as it poses in the air above its prey, descends with a rush and plunges into the water, and if successful bears its quarry away to its young. It builds its massive nest usually in a tall tree, but even on the ground in certain protected situations, and often in fields near occupied habitations in thickly settled districts, as well as on the shores of lonely northern lakes. It is friendly or at least tolerant to some farm birds, and the crickets and night herons sometimes rear their young among the loose sticks of its eyrie. The early settlers, though often fishermen, cherished and protected it, and the immortal Wilton wrote a poem commemorative of this mutual trust and familiarity. It has remained for our modern thoughtless civilization to destroy this bird recklessly until it is almost a rarity. Virtual extermination has been its fate in England, but that country would now gladly restore it were this possible. Shall we not profit by this mistake of the mother country before the opportunity is past?

In certain of our eastern states, it is the custom for sportsmen to station themselves at some favorable point on the line of flight of migratory hawks and to shoot them down by hundreds, sometimes attracting them by a lure, usually a stuffed owl. It should be a source of gratification to nature lovers to note that at the 1926 meeting of the American Ornithologists' Union at Ottawa, Canada, a resolution was adopted as follows: "Resolved, that the American Ornithologists' Union deplores the present tendency to wantonly destroy birds of prey as more likely to result in economic loss than in gain; and also deplores the use of the word 'vermin' for these birds as tending to produce an unwarranted prejudice. Such expressions, which reflect the views of thousands of Nature lovers, and the recent organization of a society which has for its purpose the reasonable protection of these much persecuted birds, mark steps in the right direction. If man's search for knowledge is to justify itself he will preserve these beautiful forms of life for his posterity."

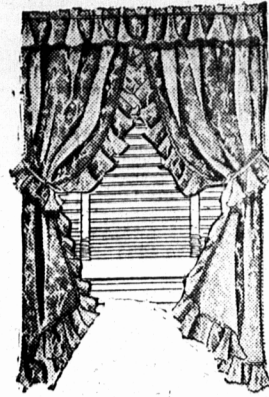

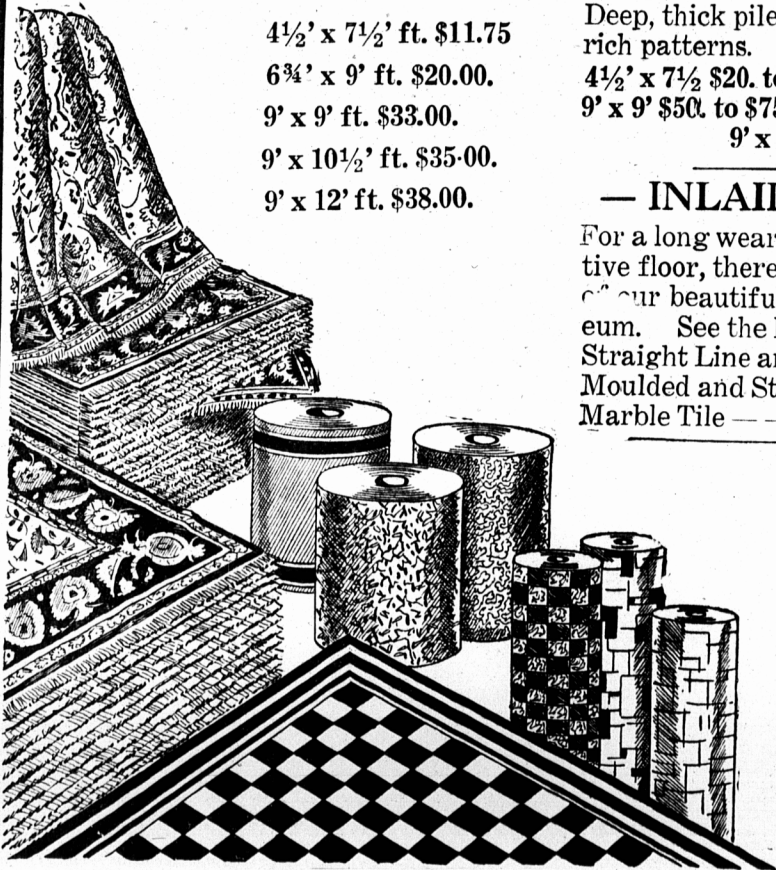
