This mail special will leave every evening except Saturday at 9 o'clock, to connect with the steamers. The mails will close half an hour earlier.

An old-fashioned watch night service will be held in the First Methodist Church tonight beginning at a quarter to eleven. Rev. Mr. Dobson will preach.

The eastern train was held yesterday afternoon till four o'clock in order that the people from the east attending the funeral of the late Benj. Hertz might return home the same afternoon.

Rev. F. A. Wrightman, Alberton, received from his wife a number of Christmas remembrances, chief of which was a beautiful set of Persian lamb furs. The gift was greatly appreciated.

THERE was only a fair attendance at the market yesterday. Poultry was quite plentiful but slight change in prices. Geese sold from 10 to 11c, per lb, turkeys 14 to 15c, and chickens 7 to 8c. Eggs remain at 25c per doz, and butter, per lb, 22 to 24c. The price of pork was from 5 1/2 to 5 3/4 per lb, with a slight tendency downward.

COMPLAINTS are reaching the Railway Commission that parties in Nova Scotia and Cape Breton, who want to purchase hay on account of the shortage in the crop last year, cannot get a supply over the intercolonial. The commission has no control over the government road, but the matter was referred to the railway department and the answer was that there was a scarcity of cars on the I. C. R.

His death took place in Yarmouth on Tuesday last of Rev. E. L. Coffin, colored preacher of the A. M. E. Church. Then came word from Halifax that the Acadia Refinery Co., of Halifax had advanced prices five to ten cents a hundred pounds.—St. John Telegraph.

By the recommendation of the District Committee the Baptist Home Mission Board has engaged James D. McLeod, school teacher of P. E. Island, and prospective student for Acadia College—for Western Jertore. This is a good field, and all believe that this young man who has lately given himself to the ministry is a suitable preacher for this church.—Messenger and Visitor.

Rev. R. W. Stevenson will be the speaker at the Y. M. C. A. meeting Sunday afternoon. The fire alarm sounded a few minutes before eight yesterday morning for a blaze in the roof of the carpenter shop of the P. E. I. R. It had originated from a stove in one corner of the building which set fire to some scantling overhead. The flames rapidly spread along the roof and took all the attention of the Fire Department for over an hour, as well as the railway employees who rendered valuable assistance before the fire was subdued. The machinery which was in another part of the building was uninjured and by afternoon the burnt portion was hoisted in by the Railway carpenters.

Hertz whose remains were laid to rest in the People's Cemetery. Many were present from Souris and other parts of the province as well as the near by surrounding country. Peters, John McLean, Souris, A. B. Warburton, F. L. Hazard. The many beautiful floral tributes were borne on a sleigh preceding the hearse.

PHILHARMONIC RECITAL.

Goethe has described music as angel-pioned, of godlike worth, and having the power to pierce man's being to its inmost core. The people of Charlottetown have not been without opportunities of indulging the saying of the seer.

The First Methodist Church was well filled last evening with an audience that accorded an appreciative attention throughout the rendering of the sacred cantata "The Holy City" by the Philharmonic Society. Regrets had been expressed at the former rendition in Grace Church that the acoustic conditions were not all that could be desired, and that the organ was somewhat smaller than the oratorio merited. Last evening's recital was without such drawbacks. One could have wished that the Society numbered just twice as many. A vast auditorium and majestic music admit of full voice choirs.

Miss Temple fills delightfully the need in our city of a high, clear soprano. Never has she been heard to better advantage than in the solo "These are they which came out of great Tribulation," and in the sustaining of the more difficult choruses notes.

Mrs. Eardley Lyndman's voice sounded very sweet in the contralto solo "Eye hath not seen."

Miss Canning rendered "Come ye blessed" with much artistic grace.

The solos by Messrs. Moore, Ritchie and Stanley contributed to the pleasure of the audience.

The absence of Miss Collings was noted with regret, her true full voice being specially adapted to the blending of tones in chorus work.

The gem of the Cantata to many was the sublime chorus "Thine is the Kingdom," a triumphant outburst of the faith that reaches high and holds with firm hands.

Professor Watts plays the clarinet with the ease of the virtuoso, his piano touch is so exquisite, one wonders why he doesn't make more of it, but the organ is emphatically "anime dimidium suae."

His accompaniments are marvels of musicianly skill and keen sympathetic intelligence. He has raised the standard of music in our city very appreciably. He has taught us, and we knew it not before, that song is the musical setting of eloquence, that art of wondrous possibilities.

A thousand pities if the Philharmonic Society continues not its ministry of music.
