Bracken Says Government Lost Heavily

OTTAWA, Sept. 16—(CP)—John Bracken, Progressive Conservative leader, said in a statement tonight that the results of the Pontiac by-election, won by Real Tompkins, candidate for Union Des Fecteurs, had made it clear that the government and the C.C.F. have "lost heavily." He paid tribute to the campaign waged by the Progressive Conservative candidate, Hector Selke, and the assistance given him by Ivan Sabourin, party leader in Quebec. Prime Minister Mackenzie King heard the results of the elections at his summer home in Kingsmere, Ont., but made no comment on the outcome. Mr. Sabourin, prominent Montreal lawyer, said that "the vote as it stands shows that nearly three quarters of the voters of Pontiac have voted against the government which shows the unpopularity of the Tories."

Joseph Braithwaite, Conservative member for Holderness said the authority given by the legislation permitted governments to refuse as well as grant licences for flying liquor sales. In the House of Lords, Lord Balfour of Inverchry said in discussion on the bill nationalizing civil aviation that its effect was to clamp down on any expression of adventure and initiative. "Why should there not be regulations comparable to those at sea, so that marriages can be performed in the air?" he asked.
